

#### 6 MEN HANGED FOR CRIME OF ONE

Death March of Italians Started in Louisiana This Morning -Murder ' was Committed Three Years Ago.

Amite, La., May 9—The death marca of six Italians to be hanged for the murder of Dallas Calmes began at 11.55 o'clock. The first pair to go to the scaffold were Roy Leona, of Brooklyn, N. Y., and Natal E. Deamore, of New Orleans. A priest accompanied each of the condemned men. The double trap was sprung at 12.01 p. m. The mea apparently died instantly. Under the law they were to hang for twenty minutes.

The crime for whica the six men paid the supreme penalty was committed shortly after midnight May 8, 1921. Dallas Calmes, a restaurant operator, was aroused by a noise at the rear of his home and upon investigating was shot down by a man dimly discernible in the darkness. The authorities immediately summoned bloodhounds at Crystal Springs, Miss., and telephoned the New Orleans police.


