IMPROVEMENT NEEDED.

Of late Campbellton citizens have been obliged to go without their evening mail until the following morning and St. John and other papers are thus twenty-four hours old and of little value when received, besides important letters are often delayed.

The reason for this delay is the late arrival of the Local express due here at 6.45.

When this train reaches here at 7.45 or later the mail does not reach the office until after 8 o'clock, when all the clerks have gone for the day.

Last Saturday evening the Local arrived here at 8 o'clock, but box holders got no mail until Monday morning.

At the present time all the mail, except that from the west Limited, for Campbellton post office arrives between 6 p. m. and 6 a. m. The present staff, consisting of the Postmaster and four clerks, are required to be on duty at 7 o'clock a. m. to sort the mail before 8 o'clock. A clerk also has to be at the office each night from 9 to 12 to sort the letters from the letter boxes and make up the mails for outgoing train.

At the present time the staff are working long hours, and it does not seem possible to put more work on their shoulders.

As nearly all the work could be done at night, the suggestion has been made that perhaps the Post Office department could make a change whereby one or two clerks would be on night duty all night and do away with some of the day clerks.

Some improvement is needed and we suggest that the Board of Trade take up the matter and endeavor to have a change made.

CORRUPTING THE ELECTORATE.

There seems to be no shortage of news print paper in St. John as the Tory organ of that city is sending hundreds of copies free to Restigouche ratepayers in an endeavor, no doubt, to corrupt the morals of the electorate. Many copies are refused at the post office, but they keep on coming. We hope the surplus will find its way to the Red Cross so that some good may result from the wilful waste of good material, if it is only as old paper.

Information comes from Dalhousie that the Dalhousie Lumber Company has sold all its pulp wood to the International Paper Co., an American concern, and that it will need 400 cars to transport it to the purchasers. How long are foreigners going to be permitted to rob the people of this country of their natural resources? They take our lumber, leaving us nothing but the stumps and the tops; they take our nickel, and sell it to our enemies. They juggle with our wheat, and fix the price we shall pay for it, they rob us of our cattle, and our people have to pay through the nose for meat, and also for boots and shoes. The Liberal party will not alter this state of things, because their sentiments are those of Free Trade; the Conservatives will not alter this because they do not.

text books in use at present in Quebec represent a curriculum that is either perhaps than anything else in Canada, even the Catholic Church. Also in our Latin courses as at present arranged, there is far too great a jump between the Fabular Faciles and the easiest Caesar. This is being solved in England by sources to simplified texts, in these texts, the chapters regularly increased in difficulty. Often times stories in Latin are too long for beginners. One danger which more than another threatens the continuation of the study of Latin for practical purposes, is surely pedantry.

In conclusion, I would state that Latin, especially if it is associated with French, is the language which offers the greatest opportunities of linguistic training for the average student. And that, both from its practical connection with English and from its usefulness as a means of mental training, is an ideal study from the educational point of view. And that, in order to secure the best, speediest, and most lasting results, the language must be studied on proper principles.
