

graph in yesterday's World relating the troubles about the supply of cement for the city buildings. McRae & Co. are sub-contractors under Eliott & Neelon. The terms of their agreement are that the cement supplied must be approved of by the city authorities. They claim that the cement supplied is of the best brand and guaranteed by the English manufacturers. The trouble. Mr. Smythe says is that the architect's testing officer is not an expert. In proof of this they instance the fact in one lot of cement, all of the same brand and of the same consignment, the testing strength of the various barrels ranged from 180 pounds up to 315. The contractors requested that the cement should be submitted for test to the Quebec Provincial Laboratory or to the Admiralty, when they would guarantee that it would stand the test up to 400 pounds to the square inch instead of 250 which is all the architect demands. The firm, however, was quite content to take away what the city rejected, but objected to the word "condemined" being stencilled on the barrels. Mr. McNally only supplied yours condemned and the row arose out of Mr. McNally objecting to the barrels being stencilled with the objectionable word. Mess:s. 
