Justice Kelly Pospones Woodstock Infant Case

## PARENTS SEEK CUSTODY

Five Actions Before Weekly High Court on Saturday

At the weekly high court on Saturday Justice Kelly made on order postponing the hearing for two weeks re Tanner infant, an application by the parents for the custody of a child. The motion came up again after being adjourned and as the applicants were not ready to proceed postponement was made on condition that the applicants pay the costs fixed at \$20 before November 8. If the costs are not paid the motion will be dismissed with costs. F. H. Greenlee appeared for the motion and A. S. Hall, of Woodstock, for the defendant. The Woodstock Children's Aid Society.

Re Gerry and Holland, an order was made under and A. L. Backburn, purchaser of the land, referred the matter to the local master at London to inquire as to title and report whether the vendor can make and convey to the purchaser a good title to the lands in question. U. A. Buchner appeared for the vendor and W. C. Fitzgerald for the purchaser.

Judgment was reserved in the matter of McDonald and Johnson, an application under the Real Estate and Mortgage Act for a declaration that a mortgage standing against certain lands to a mortgagee, now deceased, has been paid off. L. A. Buchner appeared for the mortgagee and J. J. Murphy for the purchaser.

An order was made in the matter of O'Brien and Stevens, confirming the report of the local master in which it was found that the vendor, Charles O'Brien, had a good title to certain lands on Richmond street, Kent County. O. L. Lewis, K. C., appeared for the vendor and Brackin & LaMarsh for the purchaser.

## ADJUST OCEAN RATES FOR CANADIAN FLOUR

TORONTO, Oct. 30.—The Canadian National Millers' Association has received an announcement from the Canadian Shipping Company that the differential ocean freight rates have been adjusted, bringing the price of export flour from Canadian ports to within five cents of what exported in the same quantities. The former difference was 25 cents. This will promote the export of flour to European countries, giving the benefit of milling and of cattle feed supplies to Canadian interests.

The officers elected are, President, General A. E. Cooke, Montreal; first vice-president, George A. Macdonald, Peterborough; second vice-president, J. E. MacFarlane, Toronto; secretary-treasurer, W. S. Evans, Winnipeg.

Twenty Canadian millers were elected as a board of directors.

## WANT THE DOMESTICS INCLUDED IN BILL

HAMILTON, Oct. 30.—At a meeting of the United Women's Educational Federation of Ontario held to-day a resolution was passed petitioning the Ontario Government to include domestic servants as beneficiaries under the Workmen's Compensation Act, and requesting that domestic servants come under the provisions of the minimum wage bill.

A resolution was passed calling upon Hon. R. H. Grant, minister of education, to have swimming pools installed in all public schools in the province.

Principal Haggarty, of Harbord Street Collegiate Institute, Toronto, was commended for his stand in opposition to a proposal that boxing should be taught in high schools.

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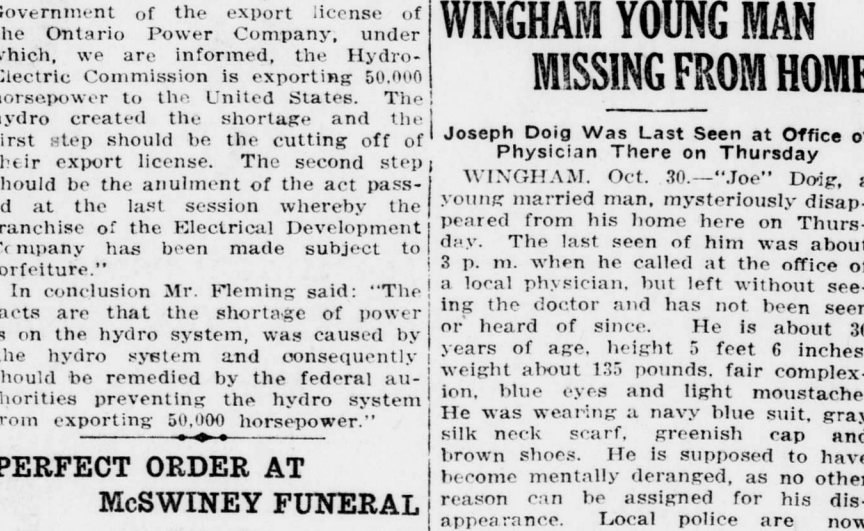
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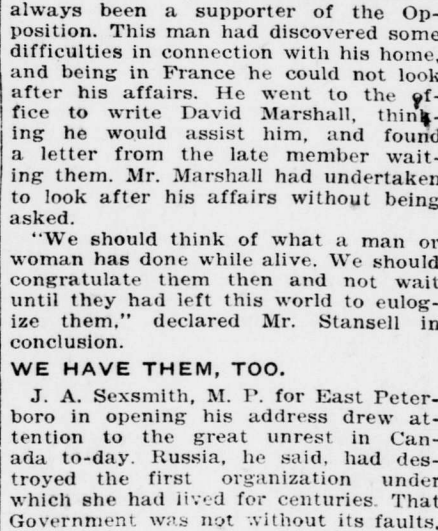

## FLYNN'S FRIENDS THE DISTURBERS

Trying to Make Trouble for Premier on Coast DISORDERLY AT MEETINGS

VICTORIA, B.C., Oct. 31.—(Special to The Free Press.)—Extremist agitators from the Grand Army of United Veterans, an organization which acknowledges J. Harry Flynn as its leader, and whose chief aim is the obtaining of a \$2,000 cash bonus for every man who donned the khaki regardless of whether he served in France or not, are causing trouble at the prime minister's meetings.

Representing an inconsequential element of returned soldiers and resorting to tactics antithetical to the whole spirit and traditions of the Canadian corps, these "Flynnites" attended the premier's gatherings and by posting themselves at strategic points among the audience succeeded in creating considerable noise and disturbance.

Representing the vast majority of returned soldiers and veterans, who were not so formidable, but in Victoria, where smaller meeting places made them a larger fraction of the total gathering, the "Flynnites" were much more demonstrative and troublesome.

At times when Mr. Meighen was speaking it was almost impossible to hear what he was saying and although the audience, which was at least 90 per cent. Pro-Government, angrily appealed to the disturbers to be quiet, threatening them with ejection, they continued their heckling to the end.

When Mr. Meighen attempted to explain to them what the Government had done for returned men they jeered and heckled more than a score speaking at the same time, and the name of Harry Flynn was cheered repeatedly. The prime minister, however, was not to be put down. Realizing that he was only a comparative hand who was creating the uproar, he hit back at the hecklers with characteristic vigor, and at the close of his address, which was a masterly presentation of the record and policies of the Government, as well as a penetrating and devastating analysis of the inconsistencies of his political opponents, he was given a tremendous ovation by the crowd.

FOR THE GOVERNMENT.

Judging by the great crowds that struggled outside to see and hear the prime minister, Victoria, like Vancouver, is strongly Pro-Government. Thousands had to be turned away from the largest theater in the city, and the overflow meeting held in the large banquet room of the Empress Hotel was crowded to the doors.

The premier, although he had spoken for more than seven hours the previous day at Vancouver, and had spent a busy afternoon receiving delegations of various public bodies and local organizations, was in great fighting form, and apart from the few agitators who were professed against reason, made a strong impression upon his hearers.

HYDE PARK ENTERTAINMENT.

HYDE PARK, Oct. 30.—Hyde Park Presbyterian Church on Thursday night added another to its lengthy list of successful foot suppers. The finest autumn weather, together with the good roads, enabled many from a distance to be present and to do ample justice to the tempting array of delicacies. The program which followed was greatly appreciated. There were numbers by the Harmonic Male Quartet, of London, and Alice Dunbar, also of London. The thanks of the present to those who aided in the enterprise were expressed in conclusion by the chairman, Rev. Dr. McCrae.
