The general relations between Great Britain and the United States, are of the most friendly character, and I am well satisfied of the sincere disposition of that Government to maintain them upon their present footing. This disposition has also, I am persuaded, become more general with the people of England than at any previous period. It is scarcely necessary to say to you, how cordially it is reciprocated by the Government and people of the United States. The conviction, which must be common to all, of the injurious consequences that result from keeping open this irritating question, and the certainty that its final settlement cannot be much longer deferred, will I trust, lead to an early and satisfactory adjustment. At your last session, I laid before you the recent communications between the two Governments, and between this Government and that of the State of Maine, in whose solicitude, concerning a subject in which she has so deep an interest every portion of the Union participates.

Formly Light.—This Light will be distinguished

as a Fixed Red Light, and in order to give a clear

or berth to the North-western and South-eastern

alms of the banks of the New Channel which have

changed their positions, it is necessary when in-

ward bound from the Westward, to take the Bar of

the Channel with the Red Shore Light, upon the

east's breadth to the Southward of the Formly

Floating Light, and, after crossing the bar, which,

the soundings will show, open them as much to the

Northward, and thus passing the Floating Light,

instead of taking up and preserving these Lights in

one.

This alteration in the character of the Formly

Shore Light will also afford a distinction for iden-

tifying it when approaching from the Northward.

Leaves Light.—This Light will be so marked so

as to give a defined Light in the Rock Channel, with-

Ridden Light.—This Light will also be marked
