THE London Standard announces that the Queen has conferred an army chaplaincy on the Rev. George Smith, late incumbent of the parish of Estcourt, Natal. This gentleman, on the day of Isandula, seeing from some high ground the Zulu advance on the Buffalo, hurried to Rorke's Drift to warn the troops, and remained there through the night of the defence.
