His numerous friends here availed themselves of the opportunity of bidding him a hearty farewell.

On Sunday, February 21, at the Presentation Convent, Moncoin, Miss E. Hartley, New Ross (in religion Sister Mary Patrick), received the habit. In the unavoidable absence of the bishop, the Very Rev. P. Phelan performed the ceremony, assisted by Rev. J. Hartley, C.C., Wexford, Fathers Carroll, Whelan, McKeown, Corrady and Cahill.

The Nazareth Nuns.

The Most Rev. Dr. O'Doherty has completed arrangements for the founding of a home in charge of the Nazireth Nuns in Derry. The money required for this most desirable object is derived principally from the bequest of the late Mrs. Watters, nee McMuity, a Derry lady. His Lordship has purchased a vainable property in the neighborhood of St. Colomb's College, and the Sisters are at present in occupation.

On Tuesday, March 1, the honorary rank of LL.D. was conferred on the Lord Mayor of Dublin by the Senate of Dublin University, at Trinity College. The Lord Mayor has also been elected a di-rector of the Dublin, Wicklow and Wexford Railway by a majority of 1,435 over Col. Tighe, retiring director.

Inciting to Boycott. Daniel Molony, J. P., of Bay View, Labasheda, County Ciare, was arrested on Feb 24, at the railway terminus, Limcrick, by Sergeant Morrow, charged with having in his possession notices calling on the people of Clare to boycott Simon McAuliffe, a fishery conservator at Knock, who took a farm from which Moloney was evicted for non-payment of rent. The notices consisted of printed opies of a resolution passed by the La basheda League calling for a boycott of McAuliffe and his workmen, and asking the people to put down grabbing. Mr. Molony was released on bail.

More Evictions Jeremiah Hegerty and John Donovan tenants on the estate of Mr. Hungerford of Ballyrizzard, near Skull, were eyicted on February 27, for non-payment of rent, the former owing ten years, and the latter seven. Father Crowley, of Goleen, who some time ago underwent seven months' imprisonment, and Father Forrest, P.P., were present, and tried to effect a settlement, but failed. Everything passed off quietly, though a large number of persons had assembled as the evictions were being carried out, and there was no hostile demonstration, as anticipated. A third party who is a caretaker for the past three years, was also evicted, but was re-admitted.

Rebellious Fishermen.

The Irish Times reports that the net fishing at the Great Weir on the Shannon at Corbally, has had to cease. The reason is that three large boat full of stones were carried there from Thomond Gate by fishermen, and sunk into the bed of the river. The fact of the employing of non society hands by the manager of the Shannon Fishing Company is assigned as the motive for this outrage. The Society fishermen have now struck work. The Harbor Commissioners have granted the Shannon Fishing Company the use of their diver for the purpose of removing the obstructions. The military, police and constabulary arrested several of the picked men of the regiment, who had broken into public houses and got liquor without paying for it, and gave abuse and bad language instead. The whole affair calls for an investigation.

An Eviction Averted.

Some charitable people in Maganey recently made up a subscription to save two poor women, the Misses Dunphy, from being evicted. It appears that the Dunphys, one of whom has been an invalid for thirty years, held a little house with about two perches of a garden, for which they never paid rent on account of giving up two acres that they had held formerly. But some two years ago Mr. John Connolly, of Coolgarragh, demanded rent, and said that if it was not paid he would put them out. In consequence of these threats they gave him £1. Previous to the last sessions he served them with a notice to quit and got a decree, for they were not able to appear and had no one to speak for them. Instead of having to pay 15s., the amount that he claimed for the year's rent, it was then £4 with costs. The neighbors started a subscription, headed by the good parish priest and his curate, and collected £5, out of which the rent and cost have been paid.

Armagh's Primate on Secret Socities.

The disgraceful disturbances at Rome in September last, so carefully planned and so carefully connived at by the civil authorities, make it clear that his children are no longer safe in assembling around his throne to offer their homage and receive his benediction."
