NEWS FROM IRELAND.

A Centenary. The death occurred, on the 25th ult., of Mrs. Mahony, of Schull, at the age of 111 years.

A Protest. At a special meeting of the Tipperary Town Commissioners, held on Saturday, Feb. 26th, resolutions were unanimously adopted protesting against the proposed sale of the Waterford and Limerick Railway to the Midland and Great Western.

A Timely Resolution. The Middleton Board of Guardians, County of Cork, at their meeting on Saturday, Feb. 27th, unanimously passed a resolution expressing regret that the Chief Secretary had not included the Christian Brothers' Schools in his new Education Bill for Ireland.

Went to Australia. On Monday, February 22nd, the Very Rev. Father Bennett, C.S.S.R., Provincial of the Redemptorists, Order, left Mount St. Alphonsus, Limerick, where he had been for a few days previous to his departure for some months to Australia.

Received the Habit. On Sunday, February 21st, at the Presentation Convent, Monconin, Miss E. Hartley, New Ross (in religion Sister Mary Patrick), received the habit.

The Nazareth Nuns. The Most Rev. Dr. O'Doherty has completed arrangements for the founding of a home in charge of the Nazareth Nuns in Derry. The money required for this most desirable object is derived principally from the bequest of the late Mrs. Watters, nee McNulty, a Derry lady.

Another Good Priest Gone. The funeral of Father T. J. Murphy, pastor of Jonesboro' and Droimire, took place on Feb. 22 from the parish church in Jonesboro'. The solemn Mass of Requiem was celebrated by the Rev. A. Byrne, assisted by the Rev. B. Grant, deacon; the Rev. P. Kerr, subdeacon; the Rev. P. Segrave, master of ceremonies.

A Nationalist Convention. A very successful Nationalist Convention was held on Monday, February 22nd, in Strabane to consider the question of the contest in North Tyrone at the coming general election.

More Patriotic Relics. C. Atchison, who recently presented to the Belfast Museum two coats worn by Henry Joy McCracken, has given to the same institution the volunteer sword of the patriot.

A Memorial Requiem. Friday, Feb. 26th, being the eightieth anniversary of the death of the Most Rev. Dr. Keane, late Bishop of Cloyne, a solemn Requiem High Mass for the repose of his soul was celebrated in St. Colman's Cathedral, Queenstown.

A Phenomenon. A severe snow-storm swept over Queenstown on Feb. 19 and 20, during which a strange sight was witnessed in the harbor. Huge seas came tumbling in from the Atlantic, bearing like thunder, and as they broke on the rocks, a gigantic volume of water, of spiral shape, suddenly rose, and ascended a great height.

The Lord Mayor Honored. On Tuesday, March 1, the honorary rank of LL.D. was conferred on the Lord Mayor of Dublin by the Senate of Dublin University, at Trinity College.

Inciting to Boycott. Daniel Molony, J. P., of Bay View, Labasheda, County Clare, was arrested on Feb. 24, at the railway terminus, Limerick, by Sergeant Morrow, charged with having in his possession notices calling on the people of Clare to boycott Simon McAuliffe, a fishery conservator at Knock, who took a farm from which Molony was evicted for non-payment of rent.

More Evictions. Jeremiah Hegerty and John Donovan tenants on the estate of Mr. Hungerford of Ballyrizzard, near Skull, were evicted on February 27, for non-payment of rent, the former owing ten years, and the latter seven.

Rebellious Fishermen. The Irish Times reports that the net fishing at the Great Weir on the Shannon at Corbally, has had to cease. The reason is that three large boats full of stones were carried there from Thomond Gate by fishermen, and sunk into the bed of the river.

From Cappoquin to Clonmel. The intended transference of the Rev. Francis O'Brien, P. P., from Cappoquin to Clonmel, has caused very deep and universal sorrow amongst all classes of the parishioners, for whom he so zealously and satisfactorily labored in the practical sphere of religion.

Death of Clonmel Religious. We have to announce the death at the Presentation Convent, Clonmel, on Saturday, Feb. 20th, of Sister Mary Frances, known in the world as Miss Johanna Burke, sister of the late Mr. John Burke, of the firm of Burke, Russell & Co., Clonmel and niece of the late Very Rev. Dr. Burke, P. P., V.G., SS. Peter and Paul's, Clonmel.

A Poet's Death. The death occurred in Dublin, on February 20, of T. C. Irwin, the poet. Mr. Irwin was born May 4, 1825, in Warrenpoint, County Down. He was the son of Dr. Thomas Irwin, from whom he inherited considerable wealth.

A Blizzard in Waterford. A blizzard of unparalleled severity swept over the County Waterford on Feb. 19 and 20. A train attempting to return to Waterford from Tramore was snowed up at the Holy Cross Bridge, about three-quarters of a mile from the latter place, and traffic on the Waterford, Dungarvan and Lismore Railway was completely blocked.

Persistence Crowned. After forty-four years of prayer and penance, Anne Bath, aged eighty-seven, departed this life on Sunday morning, 20th February, 1892, in St. Patrick's Refuge, Crofton Road, Kingstown. This holy penitent received all the consoling rites of the Roman Catholic Church on the previous Friday, and the last absolution on the eve of her peaceful death.

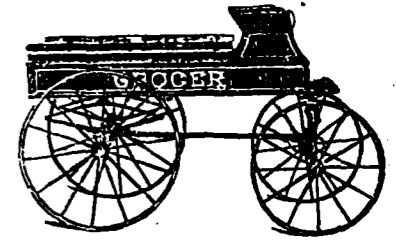
