

## THE COLLECTION

he Library's holdings reflect the varied areas of the department's interest in the spectrum of international relations. From foreign relations to international trade, from development assistance to international law, our multifaceted collection brings together documentation in a variety of formats, be they monographs, microforms, journals, newspapers, maps or even language tapes. Our sizeable collection of documents includes Canadian and foreign government materials, such as those of the United States, the United Kingdom, France, Japan and others; documentation of the United Nations and its specialized agencies, and of other international organizations such as the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), the European Community (EC), and the various development banks — the World Bank, and the African, Asian and Inter-American Development Banks, to name a few.

Our collection of monographs is classified by the standard Library of Congress (LC) Classification System used in most academic and special libraries. Our documents collection (excluding UN working documents) is classified by the alphanumeric CODOC system, based on the country of origin and the corporate author of each document.

The Library's periodicals collection is arranged alphabetically by title. The United Nations documents are arranged by the UN document classification system, UNDOC.



## **INFORMATION ACCESS**

he Library's collection of catalogued documents, monographs, periodicals and tapes can be accessed through the automated publicaccess catalogue, INNOPAC. This menu-driven system enables users to retrieve material from the Library's catalogue by author, title, subject, keyword, series, Library of Congress (LC) or CODOC number, and to print a list of the documents found. In addition to the materials currently held in the collection, the system also includes items on order for the Library prior to their arrival, and displays records of journals received or expected, issue by issue. Further, collections of both the Main and Legal libraries are accessible through the INNOPAC system.

In addition to the INNOPAC system, the Library maintains a selection of periodical indexes in its Reference Collection, in order to provide access to many journal and newspaper articles, as well as a variety of CD-ROM indexes.
