Canada-China Relations

- In 1970, Canada established diplomatic relations with the People's Republic of China. That relationship has developed significantly over the years, resulting in expanded government and commercial ties. Two-way trade has grown to about \$9.8 billion a year. Development co-operation programs have expanded in support of economic co-operation, sustainable development, human rights, democratic development and good governance in China.
- Canada—China relations have expanded considerably since the Prime Minister led a Team Canada mission to China in 1994. The largest mission ever mounted, it included federal ministers, provincial premiers and territorial leaders and close to 400 Canadian business representatives. The Team Canada mission demonstrated Canada's commitment to strengthening ties with China and has resulted in expanded contacts on all levels.
- China's stability, reform and sustainable economic growth are important to Canada. Canada's main objective has been to encourage China to maintain its open-door policy and to become fully integrated in global and regional political and economic institutions.
- Canada believes that only through systematic and wide-ranging contact
 will it be able to encourage greater openness and freedom in China and
 advance Canadian interests there. Canada is committed to helping China
 develop policies and institutions that enhance sustainable development by
 recognizing the relationship among economic growth, social development
 and environmental protection.
- Since China adopted its program of economic reform in 1978, its output has grown by an average of nine per cent a year. China now attracts almost one-third of foreign direct investment flows to developing countries. It is the world's 10th largest trading nation and is home to one-fifth of the world's population.
- Canadian enterprises have exported a large quantity of services to China in recent years as part of infrastructure projects. Canadian insurance companies, law firms and banks are well-represented in China. Over 350 Canadian companies now have offices in China.
- China's influence continues to grow. It is a permanent member of the UN Security Council, a nuclear weapons state with the world's largest active
