The French taking Advantage of this Neglect, continued to trade as before, and spread themselves by degrees into several Parts 2 1 3 bance till the Year 1727. But the good Understanding between the two Crowns being interrupted by the Siege of Rochelle, one Kirk, a French Refugee, in order to ingratiate himself with the Court of England, acquainted the then Ministry with the weak Condition of his Countrymen at Quebec. In Return for this Information, he had the Command of a Squadron of five Men of War given him, and was fent to drive the French out of every Part of Canada, and Nova Scotia being comprehended in this Commission, he took this in his Way, and destroyed all the French Settlements there, except only one at Cape Sable, where was established a Gentleman called La Tour, who had built a good Fort which he commanded himself.

The Father of this Gentleman having left his own Country under Pretence of Religion at the Time of the Siege of Rockelle, resided at London, and being a Man of good Address, he found Means to infinuate himself into the Affection of one of the Maids of Honour to the Queen, and married her. After the Marriage his Lady made use of the Interest she had with the Queen her Mistress to obtain the Honour
