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reign Court; therefore if they
 are, by wrong Informations, led
 into Mistakes, the Subject may be
 barred from all Relief, as the
 Courts in *America* are not so con-
 stituted, as to intitle them to take
 Cognisance of any Matter which
 hath undergone the Consideration
 of the Council-board.

The great Excellency and Effi-
 cacy of the *French* Institutions,
 in their Board of Commerce,
 arise principally from their not
 being at Liberty to dispense with
 the Rules and Ordinances of the
 King; which frees them from
 many irregular Solicitations: And,
 in like Manner, that the Gover-
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
