

Today's Aim is 200,000, to Help Make That Million

Citizens of Ambitious City Hold Sway at Exhibition

Nearly 100,000 People Passed Thru the Gates—Ex-Mayor Oliver Welcomes Guests at Luncheon, Attended by G.O.M. of Hamilton and Mayor Lees—Cadets Compete in Marching Contest.

Nearly 100,000 people passed thru the turnstiles at the Exhibition grounds on Saturday. It was Hamilton Day, and a record breaker for this occasion. On the same day last year 91,000 was the total attendance, but although no official figure was given, the Exhibition management was responsible for the statement that many more thousands were there on Saturday. The morning was rainy and it was feared that the Exhibition would get a setback of several thousand, but when the sun appeared at midday, the crowds began to appear and before long the largest throng of visitors thus far this year was in the grounds. At the grand stand performance in the evening, there were fully 20,000 spectators, every seat in the stand being occupied, and a huge crowd standing on the lawn.

Today it is expected that the great figure will be reached, when last year's attendance will be beaten by twenty or thirty thousand, and several police officers are concerned, there will be a squad of 50 constables in charge of Inspector Dickson on hand to keep the crowds in order.

There will be several new features today, which include the baby show, the opening of the dog show, motor boat races, swimming races, war canoe races, aquaplaning, Labor Day sports, the judging of hunters and jumpers, and many more.

Cadets Shooting. The Imperial Cadets will shoot off the third stage for the King's Trophy at Long Branch this morning, and several corps will take part in the competition before the grand stand in the afternoon in marching, manual exercises and physical drill.

Only one accident occurred on Saturday, when Albert Woodward, one of the besiegers in the "Siege of Delhi" was shot by a blank cartridge, at very close range, in the back of the neck. Just as the red-coated troops were entering the gates of the city, when the firing was at its height, Woodward fell. Many others who were supposed to be shot, fell also, but were not with him by their comrades. No one in the grand stand knew anything about Woodward being hurt, it being thought naturally that it was merely part of his make-believe role. But Woodward was unconscious when taken behind the scenes, and was removed by the hospital corps to the tent hospital on the grounds. He was later taken to his home at 132 Morse street. His neck and the back of his head were badly burned, but he is now able to be upon his feet, although it is not likely that he will appear among the British troops to-night.

With the appearance of the sun at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon, renewed hope sprang in the breasts of the Exhibition management. For the morning had been dreary, the rain had fallen intermittently, and the crowds had come very small. But when the sun cleared shortly after midday, the prospects looked brighter and chances as on Hamilton Day last year—\$1,000. At all times, however, the sky threatened to unload another deluge, and it is not expected that this figure will be reached today.

Hamilton Day was the occasion on which swarms of inhabitants of the Ambitious City visited the fair. They came early—even in the rain—and they came in crowds and bunches, and they continued to stream into the grounds until late in the day. Even the "Toronto's next greatest suburb" car had coaches loaded and crammed with them.

The sister city's leading celebrities were entertained by the Exhibition director at noon day luncheon. Over 100 were guests at the affair. Ex-Mayor Jos. Oliver presided, the Hon. Mayor Geary, Mayor Lees of Hamilton, Adam Brown, Mayor of St. John's, N.B. He ended his oration in quoting the parting words of Lord Dufferin: "Canadians, remember that Canada is a country to live and die for." Councillor Frost of Hamilton also spoke.

The principal features of the big show on Saturday were the live stock judging and the butter and cheese making. These exhibitions attracted large crowds. The cadets are making no public appearance except in the competitions before the grand stand in the afternoon and the military tattoo in the evening.

Toronto, St. Catharines and New Zealand cadets competed in the marching drill before the grand stand, and the boys from Ireland, Nova Scotia and Ridley College in the physical drill. The New Zealanders appeared to have made the best showing of the lot, their

style of marching and of handling the rifle being even superior to most militia regiments.

The experts who, as well as the City of Toronto, have placed the engine on the list of approved trucks. Prof. Angus of the School of Practical Science, and Mr. Evans of the Russell Motor Car Co.
