### TROLLEY CAR EXTENSION.

The conversation between Mr. Maclean, the member for East York, and Mr. Dineen, the latter, as published in this paper yesterday, was a revelation to many of the business men of Toronto. It made them immediately appreciate the fact that they are in direct touch with twenty-nine miles of business on Yonge-street, now served by the Metropolitan trolley line, and that this new line not only covered the line but extended on either side of Yonge-street for three miles back at least—one of the largest and finest territories in Ontario. We are not so selfish as to think that the benefit of this new communication is all on the side of the city. We believe it is equally good for the country, and especially will it be good for the villages along the trolley line, local stores included. While the trolley line draws a certain amount of shopping to the city, it has a tendency to increase the population of the villages on the line, and, in that way, to make a larger number of consumers for various local businesses that cannot be done from the city, but must be done right at hand.

We are sorry to notice that the splendid franchise for a trolley service to the east of Toronto remains idle and unexploited. Whoever owns it has failed to extend the line down the Kingston-road beyond the Hunt Club, where it practically ends nowhere. Why the Township of Scarborough does not insist on the immediate construction of the line we do not know. It would benefit everyone down that way, and the city as well. It ought to be pushed through to Whitby this fall.

There is another splendid franchise awaiting development, and that is a line from Toronto to Stouffville, running through the Township of Markham and taking in Unionville and Markham villages. If the Township of Markham were wise, it would build and own this road of itself, and any other extensions necessary, and we believe that the profits received from it, while giving the people cheap transportation, would keep the roads of the whole township in first-class repair. The road can be built for very little. The township can control its own franchise and right of way, and the value of property all through the township would be largely increased.

We have not yet begun to get on to the value of the trolley line in this country, but it is bound to arrive and to become an important factor in a very short time. We are sorry to say, however, that the legislation passed by the Ontario Assembly in the past in this direction has been more in the interests of the electric people than of the public. Mr. Hargy has gone to sleep on this question, or rather he has been hypnotized by the electric line interests. The Ontario Legislature possesses, to our mind, full and complete jurisdiction over all these roads and can regulate their fares at will, and has also the power to compel them to work together and to give running rights one over the other in the interests of the people.

### LETTER CARRIERS FOR FARMERS.

For some time past the postoffice of the United States has been experimenting with the plan of a rural home-delivery service of mail matter. Over 200 routes in various parts of the country have been established, and the result, we are told, has been a gratifying one. The number of letters delivered in this way from house to house on these routes has doubled, in some cases trebled, and in many quadrupled, and in some even quintupled. It is, therefore, likely that at an early date the system will be very much extended, and that all over the settled parts of the country the farmer will have a mail delivery at his gate or horse door. Referring to the foregoing, The Globe of yesterday suggests that it might be possible for the Postmaster-General of Canada to make a similar experiment in this country. We agree with The Globe, and would suggest that the Postmaster-General tackle Yonge-street for the twenty-nine miles of it now covered by the trolley line. The plan is to have a trolley car, as set out in this paper yesterday. Two or three carriers put on at Yonge-street in connection with this trolley service would give a first-class delivery. The Postmaster-General should also try the experiment in connection with the suburbs of Toronto and of Montreal. There are also a considerable number of towns that ought to have postal deliveries. We must keep our postoffice up to the efficiency of the postoffice of the United States.

### FOREIGNERS MUST SPEAK ENGLISH.

Mr. Hugh John Macdonald has told the electors of Manitoba that if they put him in power in that province at the forthcoming election one of his measures that he will propose will be that any foreigners coming into the province, such as Slave and Donkhorst, will not be entitled to vote until they can read and write English. Mr. Tarter, in his paper, La Patrie, is trying to make out that by this proposed legislation Mr. Macdonald intends to disqualify any of the French people of Manitoba who cannot speak English. There is no such intention, we believe, in Mr. Macdonald's mind. What it applies to, or should apply to, as we take it, are foreigners born outside of Canada. The French-Canadian population of the Northwest are born in Canada and are natives of Canada, and cannot be deprived of their civil rights.

We have the same problem here in Toronto, and it is a fact that the constituency known as Centre Toronto, which takes in a large section of the business area of the city, is controlled, as far as its vote in Parliament is concerned, by a foreign vote, born out of Canada, and which cannot speak English. We do not think that the voice of so intelligent a community as Centre Toronto should be controlled by the thousand votes within its limits, made up of foreigners unable to speak English.

The Montreal Witness, in a very interesting article dealing with the question, has the following to say in regard to Mr. Macdonald's proposition:

Explaining his policy, should he carry the elections in Manitoba, Mr. Hugh John Macdonald is reported as saying that he intends to guard against the danger of a sudden influx of large numbers of Slaves, who know nothing of the representative government or of free institutions, by enacting that they must acquire sufficient knowledge of the English tongue to be able to speak and read before they can vote.

The plan is to have a trolley car, as set out in this paper yesterday. Two or three carriers put on at Yonge-street in connection with this trolley service would give a first-class delivery. The Postmaster-General should also try the experiment in connection with the suburbs of Toronto and of Montreal. There are also a considerable number of towns that ought to have postal deliveries. We must keep our postoffice up to the efficiency of the postoffice of the United States.

### FOREIGNERS MUST SPEAK ENGLISH.

Mr. Hugh John Macdonald has told the electors of Manitoba that if they put him in power in that province at the forthcoming election one of his measures that he will propose will be that any foreigners coming into the province, such as Slave and Donkhorst, will not be entitled to vote until they can read and write English. Mr. Tarter, in his paper, La Patrie, is trying to make out that by this proposed legislation Mr. Macdonald intends to disqualify any of the French people of Manitoba who cannot speak English. There is no such intention, we believe, in Mr. Macdonald's mind. What it applies to, or should apply to, as we take it, are foreigners born outside of Canada. The French-Canadian population of the Northwest are born in Canada and are natives of Canada, and cannot be deprived of their civil rights.

### We have the same problem here in Toronto,

and it is a fact that the constituency known as Centre Toronto, which takes in a large section of the business area of the city, is controlled, as far as its vote in Parliament is concerned, by a foreign vote, born out of Canada, and which cannot speak English. We do not think that the voice of so intelligent a community as Centre Toronto should be controlled by the thousand votes within its limits, made up of foreigners unable to speak English.

### The Montreal Witness, in a very interesting article dealing with the question, has the following to say in regard to Mr. Macdonald's proposition:

Explaining his policy, should he carry the elections in Manitoba, Mr. Hugh John Macdonald is reported as saying that he intends to guard against the danger of a sudden influx of large numbers of Slaves, who know nothing of the representative government or of free institutions, by enacting that they must acquire sufficient knowledge of the English tongue to be able to speak and read before they can vote.
