Ottawa, March 29.-A militia order was ssued to-night outlining the work of the chools for qualifying and non-commission d officers. The instruction will be both ractical and theoretical, and the periods have been shortened to 12 days for cavalry nd infantry and 18 days for artillery. Canand infantry and 18 days for artillery. Candidates are requested to get up as much of the work as possible before entering the schools, and to remain as many periods as are permitted by the regulations before taking their examinations Copies of the syllabus laid down for the different classes, and directions as to what books should be studied, will be furnished on application.

Candidates seeking promotion will be divided into the following five classes; Provisional officers, lieutenants, captains and acting adjutants, majors and officers who desire to qualify for staff appointments.

TIBETAN STAG HUNT.

London, March 29 .- With no prospect of active service before them at present, a portion of the troops attached to the British mission to Thibet have welcomed the opportunity of chasing and capturing an animal never yet seen

Mr. Edmund Candler, the special corespondent of The Daily Mail with the mission, telegraphed yesterday from Chumbi (Sikkim): from Chumbi (Sikkim):
This morning when the mounted infantry were on parade at Lingmathans, a female shao, or Sikkim stag, pursued by the village dogs, broke thru the jungle on the hillside and emerged on to the plain, a hundred yards from the camp.

The mounted infantry immediately gave chase and headed the beast from the hills. An exciting pursuit followed. The shao, after sinking several times in crossing and recrossing a stream, was surrounded and captured by Captain Ottley and his sepoys. The animal was completely exhausted.

The shao is a very rare and little-known stag. The first to fall to a European gun was shot last January by Major Wallace Dunlop in the Lingmathang Hills. The specimen captured this morning is destined for England, and will be the first animal of the species to reach Europe.


