## BULL FIGHT IN DARK CHICAGO

It Was Real and Came Near Being Fatal-Two Boys Pose as Matadors.

Chicago, May 22.-Englewood had a real bull fight on Sunday, and the mat-adors, two boys, Willie Reinig and George Jessup, narrowly escaped with their lives. For some time the two boys have been reading Spanish literature, and they concluded they wanted to be matadors and receive the plaudits of their friends. Reinig's father is the owner of a big Hertford bull, with short horns capped by brass knobs. The bull is kept in a pasture near Seventh and Wood streets.

On Saturday Reinig and Jessup met by appointment and laid their plans for the bull fight. Twenty of their boy friends were told the contest would take place on Sunday. Promptly the invited guests and the principals put in an appearance at the pasture, where the fight was to take place. Reinig was armed with an old sword, while Jessup had manufactured a sword out of an old corn knife. With these the boys proposed to vanquish the bull. Reinig having the best weapon, claimed the right to the first tilt with the

At a given signal from Henry Nelson, one of the boys, who was to act as referee, Reinig advanced into the field, doffed his hat and started to worry the bull. He had gone but a little way when the animal charged upon him. He jumped aside and made a trust with his sword. The point stuck into the ribs of the animal, and with a roar it turned and dashed back upon the boy

matador.
The onslaught was too much for Reinig's prowess, and he was picked up on the horns of the animal and tossed high into the air. When he came down he landed in a corner by the fence more dead than alive. His shoulder-blade was broken and one of the horns had gouged a hole in his

arm. Jessup saw the predicament of his companion, and ran to assist him. The bull met his onslaught with lowered head, and before the boy had time to realize what had happened, he, too, was tossed high over the fence and into a ditch. The boys who have come to witness the fight ran screaming down the road. A doctor who examined the boys later said their injuries were serious, but not necessarily fatal.

# The "Paris" Aground Ladies'

Serious Accident to the Big At- on May 29 for the final stage of the lantic Liner.

She Ran Ashore on the Cornwall Coast

All Her Passengers Landed Without Mishap.

Half a Russian City Wiped Out by Fire-New South Wales Excited Over the Federation Question.

Falmouth, England, May 22.-The American Line steamer Paris (Capt. Watkins), from Southampton and Cherbourg, for New York, struck on an outlying ridge of the Manacles early yesterday morning, half a mile from where the wrecked Atlantic transport Mohegan lies. The Paris, which sailed from Southampton yesterday, called at Cherbourg, and picked up 50 passengers. Soon after 1 o'clock yesterday morning, at high tide, and in a dense tugs were soon swarming around the vessel to render assistance. A majority of the passengers, who numbered 380, were brought to Falmouth, where they obtained lodgings for the night. A majority of the passengers were not aware that an accident had happened until they were called by the stewards.
On reaching the deck they found the ship's boats in perfect readiness for their reception. The sea was perfectly calm, and the only discomfort that the passengers experienced was caused by the slight rain that was falling at the time. Owing to the calmness of the sea the boats could be managed with entire safety. Perfect order pre-

vailed aboard the vessel. The crew of the Paris are still on board the vessel. It is believed that the steamer has a large rent in her bottom in the forward part of the ship. The ship was steaming 18 to 19 knots an hour when she struck. There will be little danger to the steamer if the calm continues. Her bow is about 150 yards from the shore, and her stern about 200. There is about 16 feet of water in the three forward compartments, but the engines are apparently unharmed.

Coverack, May 22.—12 noon.—The situation of the American Line steamer Paris (Capt. Watkins), which went aground early yesterday morning just off Lowlands Point, two miles east of this place, while on a voyage from Southampton, via Cherbourg, for New York, remains unchanged this morning. The weather is fine and clear, the ea smooth and a light off-shore breeze is blowing, and everything is favorable for salving operations.

CARGO SAVED. Coverack, Cornwall, May 22.-The cargo of the American Line steamer Paris is being rapidly discharged from the two forward hatches. It is high water in this vicinity at 3 o'clock this afternoon, but it has not yet been settled whether an attempt will be made to float the steamer.

Falmouth, Cornwall, May 22.-The North German Lloyd steamer Bremen, which left Southampton on Saturday, arrived here this morning under instructions to embark for New York the saloon passengers of the Paris, which is ashore near Coverack. But the passengers were not ready to proceed on their voyage; many of them are still suffering from shock, so the Bremen continued on her passage westward. Many passengers of the Parls took the train for Southampton this morning to await the sailing of the North German Lloyd steamer Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse, which is scheduled to sail from Bremen for New York on May touching at Southampton on the following day.

AUSTRALIAN FEDERATION. New South Wales is excited over the federation question. It has been decided that a referendum shall be taken in the colony on June 20. South Australia favors federation. The referendum was passed there by 65,000 votes

against 17,000. NEARLY WIPED OUT BY FIRE. The town of Porosow, in the government of Warsaw, has been destroyed by fire. Twelve lives were lost, and 3,000 people driven from their homes are now camping in the fields. It is believed that the fire was of incendiary

origin. One-half of the city of Tobolsk, capital of the Siberian government of the same name, has been wiped out by fire. The loss will run into the millions. Tobolsk, which is a town of 21,000 inhabitants, was formerly an administra-tive center for Siberlan exiles.

> No Native Troops Left in the Northern Provinces-Aguinaldo's Men Demoralized.

Manila, May 22-8:18 p.m.-In spite of the presence of the Filipino commissioners in Manila, the military operations continue with unabated rigor. The visitors are apparently oblivious to the true condition of affairs, and are enjoying their visit here. They were immediately inundated with invitations, day and night, and express surprise at the state of affairs within the American lines. They were led to believe that everything was chaotic, and are delighted with the reception ac-

corded them. Reports from persons who have arrived from the interior show that no troops are left in the northern provinces. They were all drafted south after the outbreak of war. The villages on the west coast are almost deserted, and the Iloicanos especially are desirous of joining the Americans, if for the only purpose of

CRUSHING THE TAGALOGS. Many natives of Binguet and Ilocos said that if the Americans had not arrived civil war would necessarily have ensued, owing to the friction between the Tagalogs and the inhabitants of other provinces. It is added that the only Filipino troops now left are seven thousand men, under General Luna, at Tarlac, and about four thousand, under Gen. Pio Del Pilar. Even these are demoralized and short of arms and sup-

plies. Many of their rifles are disabled and the Filipinos are unable to repair them, owing to the lack of mechanics and materials for so doing. A coasting steamer which has arriv ed here reports that the Spanish garrison at Zamboanga, Island of Mandanao, is holding the rebels in much the same manner as the Americans held them while they were in the vicinity of Manila. Every night the Spaniards are subjected to an ineffectual fusillade. and if they are not soon relieved they will be reduced to the condition of the

"Manila, May 22 .- Adjutant-General, Washington: Conditions as follows: In Bulacan province troops are maintained at Quinga, Balinag, San Miguel. Lawton is proceeding down Rio Grande River from San Isidro. He has driven the enemy westward from San Antonio, Cariao and Arayat, where he was joined yesterday by Kebbe's column. He will reach Santa Ana and Candaba today. Macarthur is still at San Fernando, and will occupy the cities south and westward. The insurgent forces disintegrate daily. Luna's force at Tarlac is much diminished. It has destroyed several miles of railway in his front. A number of officers of rank have deserted Luna, and a few have entered Manila for protection.
