Asheville, N. C., Nov. 15 .- Will Harris, the negro, who killed two Asheville policemen and three negroes Tuesday night, was shot by a posse of men. near Fletcher, today.

The search had been pursued by hundreds of armed men from Asheville and surrounding country. Early today word was received that the negro had been discovered in a barn near Fletcher and aid was requested.
