They had backed down the yard a piece and Jenkins asked him if they had passed onto the other track. He answered that they had and both signaled to the engineer to stop. Jenkins then went to the end of the car to climb down, and in doing so lost his balance and fell. O'Leary then signaled to the engineer to stop, and called to his mate, asking him if he was hurt but got no answer. He then climbed down and found the body of the unfortunate man lying on the rails where several cars had passed over him. Mr. Robt. Wyatt, who was standing on the crossing at the time; James Cotter, the crossing watchman, and Dr. Seaborn also gave evidence, which corroborated that of O'Leary.


