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CHILD VICTIM OF COAL SHORTAGE DIES OF BURNS

Soldier's Babe Fired Clothes While Mother Sought Coal to Keep Home Warm.

AN INEFFECTUAL RESCUE

Young Brother Rushed to Sister's Assistance, But Death Intervened Today.

Little Helen Marie Griffiths, 565 Ontario street, died in Victoria Hospital this morning from burns sustained late Saturday afternoon. The child's death reveals a great tragedy.

Her father, a veteran of the great war, died last night. The child was in poor health when the tragedy occurred. She was now convalescing at Byron Sanatorium.

During his absence from home the mother has endeavored, as best she could, to fill the void of her mother and father.

Saturday there was no coal in the Grifiths home. There was no one to get it. The mother was forced to leave the child in the cold weather and make the room of the child's death.

The children were left alone in the house. There was no one to watch them. Before leaving home the mother had endeavored to heat up the house with a little coal. The children might not get too cold while she was away.

She hit a fire in the grate. It seemed to die out before she left. However, little Helen in playing around the grate, had touched the coals in the grate. She poked at the seemingly dead coals with a single stick. The fire was kindled.

Her clothes caught fire. Her little brother fought hard to save his sister. He was burned. Arthur Bridge, driver for O. J. Bridge, baker, came to the house at the moment when the child was rushed to the hospital. The blow to her baby physique was too great, however. The terrible nature of the accident, caused her death this morning.

The widest sympathy is expressed for this stricken family. Many said the mother could not be expected for leaving the babies alone. She was a victim of circumstances.

"What could she do?" asked a neighbor. "She had to have coal or let the babies freeze."

Little Helen will be buried on Wednesday.

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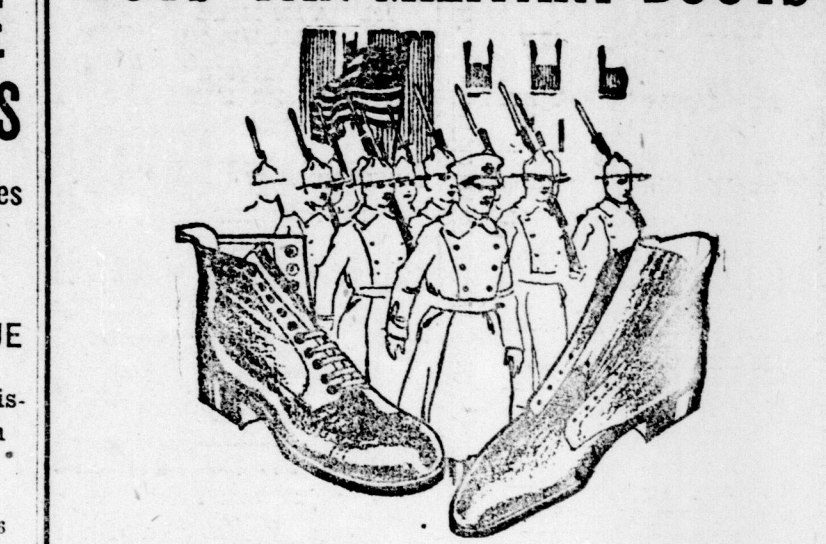
