TRAGEDY OF NORTH REVEALED BY ARREST AT WINDSOR, SUNDAY

Arthur Currie of Chatham Is
Charged With Murder of
a Trapper.

WINDSOR, March 15.—Arthur Currie, alias Arthur Walker, was arrested late Sunday night by Provincial Officers Smith and Hanna, charged with the murder of a trapper in Ontario's hinterland on January 29. Currie, who gives Chatham, Ont., as his home, is a half-breed. He has been working for the Windsor Ice and Coal Company delivering fuel. The provincial officers obtained a description of the man from Toronto, and had been looking for him since he was reported missing from the North. The trapper, who had with him his winter earnings from fur trading, left Sudbury for the North with Currie, who, the police state, was not seen again in the North after the trapper was reported missing. Provincial Officer Smith took the man to Toronto today. The prisoner is alleged to have told the officers before leaving Windsor that he was ready to confess the entire story of the killing.

Trebbett, driver of the car in which Huesor was riding, was also injured. The driver of the other machine had a speedy get-away, and his arrest has been ordered by Chief of Police Willis.

BAN NOT LIFTED.
J. C. Fletcher, inspector in the provincial housing commission while here today declared the class of homes being erected in Windsor the best in the province. He is decidedly favorable toward the plan for acquiring a municipal plot of 100 lots for the erection of 50 homes to be sold at cost. He declared the sanest solution of the housing problem.

Mrs. Margaret McRae, aged 91 years, died today at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Harold Hatcher, 7 Gladstone avenue, Walkerville.

DR. F. L. PRENTISS, chief federal immigration officer, Detroit, has heard nothing of the possibility of lifting the atomic ban generally supposed to be in force. Remaining as unchanged as the day it was enacted, it is said that the ban has been current during the past few years.

Week-end raids on alleged blind pigs in Windsor by the city's liquor squad netted eight arrests. Three hundred and fifty dollars in cash and five hundred dollars in bonds were seized. The others were remanded for further hearing.

SINISTER INFLUENCE AGAINST CANADA IN THE UNITED STATES

Clipping From Chicago Paper
Advises Investors Against
Canadian Securities.

WINDSOR, March 15.—Evidence collected by Industrial Commission Scandlers to the effect that a sinister influence in the United States was discouraging relations between that country and Canada is being prepared and will be forwarded to the minister of finance, Ottawa, by the Border Chamber of Commerce, accompanied by the plea that some action be taken through Washington to combat the evil.

As the result of a probe quietly conducted by Mr. Scandlers some time ago he today received a clipping from a Chicago publication which is "Advice to Investors" column said: "The Canadian Government has in effect, confiscated a part of the property of the paper mills in Canada. The Canadian Government has no telling how far it will go. For this reason all Canadian securities, including Government and municipal, must be considered speculative."

**CANADIAN MISSION
COST PRETTY PENNY**
OTTAWA, March 15.—Answering A. R. McMaster (Rome) in the House of Commons today, Sir George Foster said the total expense of the Canadian mission in London from its inception to January 31 was \$123,419.35.

E. W. Tobin (Richmond-Wolfe) was informed by Mr. Foster that it had been decided to hold an imperial press conference in Ottawa August 4 to 7, 1920. The officers responsible for the carrying through of the conference were the Canadian Press association. The amount of Canada's contribution towards the project is under consideration. The governments of Quebec and Ontario are each dividing \$10,000. New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia \$5,000 each.

**LIVE STOCK RECEIPTS
LIGHT AT WINNIPEG**
WINNIPEG, March 15.—Light receipts over the week-end resulted in only 154 cattle, 800 horses and 189 sheep being unloaded this morning.

Trading this morning was fairly active on the light supply of cattle. On hand the bulk of receipts being composed of common to medium grades of butcher cattle which were taken up at steady prices.

One load of good sheep passed over the scales at \$13. A load of young lambs changed hands at \$15. The hog market was again unsettled, and as there was only a limited number for disposal, bidding was keen, and quotations were fully 50 cents stronger than prospects of a still further advance.

NOMINATED LABOR CANDIDATE.
Montreal, March 15.—Alphus Macsieu, prominent as a labor man for Montreal Trades and Labor Council, has been officially nominated to be the labor candidate at the federal election to be held in the St. James division of Montreal on April 7 next.

in London.

ST. THOMAS, March 15.—Jonas Nicholas, the Indian who was arrested late Saturday on a charge of detaining Frances John, a young girl, aged 13 years, for immoral purposes, today elected trial by judge and jury, and will be given a hearing on Friday morning next before Judge Ermatinger.

The city police court was crowded to the doors this morning with natives of the Muncey Reserve, who were on hand to hear Jonas Nicholas' trial. The case has aroused considerable interest among the prisoners' native friends.

TO BE TRIED BY JURY.
Wilbur Collins and Wilfrid McCallum, two youths charged with having entered the American Express offices in the M. C. R. depot and taken therefrom a box of books, today elected trial by judge and jury, and will be given a hearing on Friday morning next before Judge Ermatinger.

JOHN BROWN CAUGHT.
John Brown, who handed Harry General, the local second-hand dealer, a worthless check in return for a \$15 coat and got \$5 change on Saturday last, has been arrested in London. The information reached here Saturday night that a man named Harry Smith had been arrested, charged with a violation of the Ontario Temperance Act, and taken to London on Sunday and identified the prisoner as the mysterious "John Brown" who fraudulently obtained the coat from his place of business. As soon as the O. T. A. charge is disposed of in London, Brown or Smith, whatever his name may be, will be brought to St. Thomas to face trial on the more serious charge.

FIFTH BANQUET.
The fifth annual banquet of the members of A. Company of the 1st Battalion, better known as "The Elgins," will be held on St. Patrick's night, March 17. The first banquet was held in this city prior to the departure of the battalion, and Major Stacey was the chairman. The next two banquets were held overseas, while the last one was held in this city at the Grand Central Hotel. All the members, including the officers of the company, will be in attendance at Wednesday night's event, and from present indications it promises to be a memorable one.

KIND-TO-ANIMALS WEEK.
A week in which the Humane Society will educate the public in the matter of being kind to all dumb animals will be held by the society in the near future. The week, which is held annually, is known as the "Be-Kind-to-Animals Week," and in past years it has done much to educate the public to the proper care of animals.

ROBBED A SECOND TIME.
The cigar store of T. O. McKnight was robbed early this morning for the second time this winter. A large amount of cigars and tobacco was removed, but the receipts of Saturday's business had been removed by Mr. McKnight when he closed up on Saturday. The clerk was in the store at 5 o'clock Sunday evening and everything was all right at that time. The lock on the rear door, which is an old-fashioned one, was picked with a skeleton key. The police have no clue.

WORK SOON TO BEGIN.
The recent mild weather has practically cleared Talbot street of ice and snow, and it will not be long before the work of preparing the main thoroughfare to receive the new asphalt paving will begin. The section to be constructed this year is from Mary street to Baladale, and it is stated that a couple of months will see the entire job completed. St. Catherine street will also be paved this year, and the gravel has already been placed in position.

**ICE AT MOUTH OF
RIVER THAMES STILL
SOLID; FLOOD FEARED**
CHATHAM, March 15.—The ice on the River Thames broke here this afternoon and is floating rapidly towards the lake. The movement of the ice is causing great concern, as it is the prospect of a flood, particularly in the neighborhood of Prairie Sliding, and the low-lying lands of Dover and Raleigh Townships, as the ice is still intact at the mouth of the river. Farmers along the banks of the river are being urged to take measures to protect their stock.

COVERED BY INSURANCE.
Charles Austin today estimated that stock to the value of \$180,000 was affected by water, as a result of the break of a two-inch water pipe of the sprinkler system at his store on Sunday morning. Mr. Austin stated that he is protected from loss under a special policy taken out when the sprinkler system was installed.

EXTENSIVE IMPROVEMENTS to the buildings at the Chatham fair grounds are planned by the executive of the West Kent Agricultural Society. Among the improvements will be a commodious addition to the present grandstand, new entrances to the grounds and an efficient system for accommodating automobiles and rigs.

TAKE TWO SEASONS.
City Engineer Adams, who has been instructed by the water commission to build a new waterworks plant for the city, today said he expected to complete the construction of a new intake pipe, to be placed at a point several miles upstream, this season, and stated that it will take two working seasons to complete the proposed new plant.

ANSWERS LAST CALL.
George Pritchard, a veteran fireman, responded to "the last call" yesterday in his 63rd year, following an illness of pneumonia. He served for nine years in the old volunteer fire department, and for 25 years has been a city fireman. He is survived by his wife, daughter, Mrs. J. T. Richards, of Morpeth, and one son, John, of this city. Fire Chief Pritchard, city; William of Toronto; Edward, of Detroit; Jack and Noah, city, are brothers.

Stratford Wants Civic Elections Held
First Monday in December.

STRATFORD, March 15.—The city council tonight decided to petition the Ontario Legislature to revise the municipal act so that municipal elections may be held on the first Monday in December, and the nomination a week earlier. The polls to be open from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

WINDSOR LOOKS FOR MEASURE OF CONTROL OVER FERRY COMPANY

Provincial Officers Investigating
Rapportta Murder
Mystery Have Clues.

WINDSOR, March 15.—Definite action by the Government at Ottawa, whereby some control over the operation of the Detroit and Windsor Ferry Company will be given the city of Windsor, is expected by Mayor Winter. He informed the city council at its meeting tonight when authorization was given for a deputation consisting of the mayor, six aldermen and the crown attorney, J. H. Rodd, to confer with the Government at the capital regarding the regulating of the service and rate of the company.

Estimates for conducting the glassy Board of Health for 1920, as tabled at the Windsor city council tonight totalled \$28,300, apportioned on a population basis among the various municipalities.

POLICE HAVE CLUES.
While no definite connection between the murder of Morris Rapportta, Wyandotte merchant, who was murdered by bandits in his store over week ago and the shooting fray on Sandwich street, west late Sunday night, has been established at a late hour, the Chief of Police Willis told the Advertiser that George Collins of Detroit, near death in the Hot Die Hospital and Jack McKinnis, also of Detroit, held by police in connection with the shooting may be held in connection with the Rapportta case.

Collins, according to his physician, Dr. Moody, is very weak, and at a late hour it was doubtful if he would survive the night. He was shot near Steppen's Inn during an argument with his companion. Following orders from Toronto, provincial officers Smith and Hanna today started investigation of the Rapportta case and tonight discovered an eyewitness of the tragedy, who furnished several new clues on which they are working. No arrests have yet been made.
