MINOR IMPROVEMENTS TO FURNISH BUSINESS FOR NO. 2 COMMITTEE

Any Matters of Importance Will Be Laid Over Till 1921.

Minor public improvements are likely to furnish most of the business for the final meeting of No. 2 committee of the city council tonight. Any matters of more than passing importance will be laid over until the 1921 session. A deputation of ratepayers from Dufferin avenue, between English and Ontario streets, likely will be present to protest against the proposed widening of the road, which has just been completed. They claim that they agreed to the widening on condition that a road be built at a cost of \$2,000. The work was done for the present year and will cost more than \$5,000. They claim that they could have a pavement for the road, and have ten years in which to pay it, whereas they must pay for a gravel road in three years.

I am sure that everyone who desires to get a bottle of liquor should first get a license from the license inspector for a sum of \$10. The license should be good for one year.

The person with the license should then be able to obtain a bottle from a Government vendor, but only one at a time. A receipt for the bottle should be kept on the license, so if anyone was obtaining too much his license could be cancelled. A man who is convicted of drunkenness he should lose the license. New York, Dec. 14.—The American Sugar Refining Company announced today another reduction of 1-4 cent in the price of refined sugar to the basis of 5-1/2 cents per pound for fine granulated. Quotations of other refiners remained unchanged, ranging from 5-1/4 cents to 5-1/2 cents.

RED TRIANGLE NOTES

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OFF THE RAILS

The movement of freight at Port Erie and the Niagara frontier has increased by one-third during the past few days, according to local officials.

On Monday 600 cars were reported to have crossed the border at Port Erie alone. Four hundred cars are considered a normal day's business. The movement of coal has increased in proportion to the other freight.

WILL INCREASE TRAFFIC. Navigation on the Welland and Burlington canals will close on Wednesday, Dec. 15, and the gates on both waterways will be locked. With the closing of this system of navigation it is expected that the rail traffic between Buffalo and Toronto over the eastern district of the local division will increase materially.

MAIN LINE BLOCKED. When a truck of a freight car broke near Harrisburg on Monday afternoon the main line of the G. T. R. was blocked for nearly four hours. The accident happened at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. The auxiliary from Hamilton cleared up the derailment.

SHOULD HELP LONDON. Owing to the fact that the last boats loaded with coal destined to the upper lakes left the docks at Buffalo on December 10, it is expected that the coal movement into Ontario will be greatly increased in the near future. Owing to the fact that water transportation is much cheaper than rail, all the coal available was rushed to the head of the lakes before the season closed, and so the supply for Ontario suffered during the past few months.

The G. T. R. lake and rail transportation closed on December 4.

Hon. Manning Doherty Addresses Second Annual Convention of U. F. W. O.

CO-OPERATION IS KEYNOTE

Mrs. G. A. Brodie Emphasizes Necessity of Mutual Assistance.

Toronto, Dec. 14.—"Co-operation" was the keynote of the second annual convention of the United Farm Women of Ontario, which was held today at Foresters' Hall, presided over by Mrs. G. A. Brodie, the retiring president.

Co-operation in community interests and in nation building was emphasized by the president's address. The various committee reports and in the annual addresses which were on the program. While this is the separate convention of the U. F. W. O., they will be a part of the convention proper, which the United Farmers will hold tomorrow.

The Hon. Manning Doherty addressed the convention for a short time before the noonday adjournment.

Mr. Doherty, in welcoming the large gathering of women, expressed the hope that he would live to see the day when the people in the country would have equal representation with socially and economically, as those in the cities. He also looked forward to the time when the mothers will not have to leave the farms in order to give their children inadequate education, but that this might be obtained at home.

Mr. Doherty told of a community hall which he would like to see emulated in every county and used as a centre for agricultural and educational purposes. If the people provided such halls, Mr. Doherty expressed the opinion that the Government would assist with suitable staffs for the various courses that might be put on.

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
