MACKENZIE A TRUSTEE.

Justice Riddell Gives Opinion in Suit for Damages.

Justice Riddell, giving counsel in the Dominion Brewery case, now going on in the assize court, his idea of the case at present, said, at the close of the hearing last yesterday afternoon: "Suppose William Mackenzie had a full knowledge of the negotiations going on between the Cissell-Orpen syndicate and the Dominion Brewery, would he be greater against him than against the vendors of the brewery, the right of the Miller party, Mackenzie was acting as trustee, buying the property intending to benefit Case.
