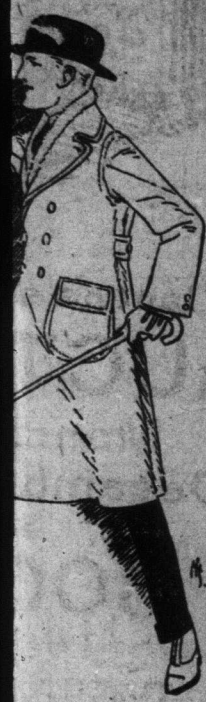

New York, Dec. 14.—No curtailment of
championship competition in lacrosse
among the colleges of the country was
announced yesterday at the annual meet-
ing of the United States Intercollegiate
Lacrosse League, held at the Park Avenue
Hotel. On the contrary, the officials of
the league and the delegates from the
colleges discussed arrangements for a
schedule for next year. While nothing
definite was done toward formally adopt-
ing one, it is expected that this will be
attended to shortly.

The leading colleges in the league have
all been hit hard by the war, and with
that in view, it was decided to introduce
the game in the preparatory schools,
so that the depleted ranks of college la-
crosse players may be restocked. Yale

TWO TEAMS OR OVER IN WORLD'S SERIES

A fair line on the number of players
used in recent years can be gained from
the list of eligibles for the world series
as promulgated by the National Commis-
sion each season since 1905. The teams,
of course, in each case were the win-
ners of their respective league pennants
and yet the records disclose that there
has been hardly a case where the full
number of eligibles were actually called
into action. Eighty players registered
with the New York Giants and the Phila-
delphia Athletics in 1905 is the minimum
and the average for the entire thirteen
years is twenty-two and a fraction play-
ers per team. The list follows:
