ASSIST SOLDIERS ON EMPIRE DAY

Motor Car Collection of Funds
and Comforts From
Schools.

PROGRAM COMPLETED

Hon. R. A. Pyne Issues State-
ment in Connection With
Celebration.

The empire day program is now
completed. There will be an automo-
bile collection of funds and soldiers
comforts from the various schools
on empire day, May 22. This automo-
bile collection will be arranged by the
Y. M. C. A. and will be taken up on
that day between one and two o'clock.
Representatives of the schools will go
to be conveyed to Queen's Park, where
the automobiles will line up on the
west side of the crescent.

From two to five automobiles will go
to each school and, where a motor will

not accommodate the contributions, a
truck will be provided. At a saluting
point on University avenue an auto-
mobile from each school will stop and
a girl will hand a card to Col. Thomp-
son containing the school's list of con-
tributions. The funds will then be left
at the Y. M. C. A.

Girls will largely represent the
schools, as the boys will be in the
Cadet Corps parade. Contributions of
all kinds will be made.

The Public School Athletic Associ-
ation has made arrangements to send
one parcel a month to each of the pub-
lic school teachers at the front. The
collection of this parcel will be made
thru the Public School Athletic Associ-
ation.

Hon. R. A. Pyne, minister of educa-
tion, has issued the following state-
ment in connection with the celebra-
tion:

"I desire to take the present oppor-
tunity of thanking the educational au-
thorities of the schools throughout the
province for the way in which empire
day has been celebrated in the past,
and to express the hope that for the
present year these exercises may be
made a still more efficient means of
inspiring national and imperial senti-
ment. I believe that the glorious share
which the Province of Ontario has had
in the struggle for liberty and the
freedom of humanity is due in some
measure to early impressions made
by such exercises as these. It is not
long since that a handful of Cana-
dians, less than forty thousand in all,
were the only barriers that stood be-
tween German barbarians and the sea,
and history will tell to all succeeding
generations the story of how nobly
they performed their task upon that
dreadful day.

"In some of the schools it has been
the practice in the past to use contribu-
tions by the children for the purchase
of flowers for decorative pur-
poses; where this has been the prac-
tice, would recommend that these
funds, whether large or small, be de-
voted to supplying comforts for the
soldiers at the front. The contribu-
tions, of whatever kind, may either be
shipped directly to the front or may
be handed over to the local Red Cross
Society.

"This is the day of sacrifice, and I
am firmly convinced that our present
sacrifices must be a source of moral
purification, and must contribute ma-
terially to the upbuilding of a sound,
serious and noble national sentiment."
