British ship Rahane, Captain Scott, from Rotterdam for San Francisco, has put into Montserrat with captain sick. The vessel encountered heavy weather and lost some sails.

Steamship Indriani which arrived this morning from Glasgow is to be chartered by her general cargo at the Corporation pier. She has on board 24,000 bags of Scotch hard coal for city merchants.

Robert Bennett, of Rumford Falls, Me., is at the Clifton. He is on his way to the Nova Scotia woods on a hunting expedition. Mr. Bennett is a member of the mechanical staff of the International Paper and Paper Mills at Rumford Falls.

Miss Mary Wood, aged 85, died at the Women's Home, Windsor last Tuesday night, after a lingering illness. Miss Wood had boarded at the home for the past five years. Miss Wood was a native of Scotland and a sister-in-law of George Wham—Winnipeg Free Press.

SERIOUS FIRE LAST NIGHT

A. & I. Isaacs' Cigar Factory Burned—Loss Said to be \$26,000.

There was a serious fire on Prince William St. last night when the premises of the Imperial Cigarette and Tobacco Co. were damaged to an extent estimated at \$26,000.

Considerable damage was done by water to the printing stock of Roger Hunter on the second floor and the furniture of Mrs. Landan, which was stored on the third floor, also suffered. Tilley and Fairweather, on the ground floor, were able to remove much of the office fixtures but sustained some loss.

The premises referred to are situated in the Gardner building, owned by Mrs. W. Daniel and Miss Gardner and the fire was discovered shortly after eleven o'clock. An alarm was sent in from box 6 and the fire department promptly responded.

By midnight the flames were extinguished. No. 1 Salvage Corps and Fire Police did valuable work in protecting property of tenants from damage by water. The damage to the cigarette company's stock is reported to be very heavy as there was an unusually large stock of tobacco on hand. There was \$10,000 insurance on the building, \$15,000 on the Imperial Cigarette Co's stock, of which A. & I. Isaacs are the principal owners.

The damage to the furniture of Mrs. Landan, \$2000 on Roger Hunter's stock and plant and \$800 on Tilley and Fairweather's stock is reported to be very heavy as there was a large stock of goods on hand. Detailed particulars of the insurance will be found in another part of this issue.
