San Francisco, July 4--Bill Squires, the much-heralded champion of Australia, succumbed to the blow of a Canadian star at Colma today after he had been in the ring two minutes with Tommy Burns. The men who witnessed the brief meeting between the pugilists were charitable enough not to call him a "dub." They designated him "a Blue Alarm" who should have been pitted against a fourth rate fighter rather than any pugilist with the slightest possession of ring skill.


A ROYAL SLAVE
