# ARMISTICE DAY IMPERIAL BILL EXCELLENT ONE

"Her Man o' War" Thrilling  
Picture of German  
Spy Work

A remarkable inside view of the sinister workings of the German intelligence department during the war forms the basis for tense drama, suspense and thrilling action of "Her Man o' War," Jettie Goudal's first starring vehicle, which is the appropriate Armistice Day bill at Imperial Theatre and attracted many last night.

This material, rather than the battle scenes to which one is accustomed in war pictures, supplied the grim menace that laid behind the comedy and romance with which the picture was packed. It was a pitting of the wits of an Allied prisoner, who was really a spy, against the cunning, experienced and scientific head operative of the German secret service, Professor Krantz. William Boyd was the prisoner, Frank Reich, the professor.

The fact that the action takes place in a new locale for war pictures—a quiet sector behind the German lines—takes the plot out of the usual channels and not only enhances the drama and melodrama, but gives a quaint and beautiful setting for the romance between the star and Boyd.

Despite grim danger and thrills that keep the spectator's spine tickling and hair rise, the love story and the comedy element of "Her Man o' War" predominate. Jettie Adams, Christie comedy star, and his partner in hilarity, Kay Deslys, supply a great deal of humor, and the triangle of love interest formed by Miss Goudal, Boyd and Grace DeLeon, the latter playing a German countess, furnishes still more effective comedy throughout, up to a really snappy, happy and satisfactory ending.

The travel film, "Down to Damascus"—first of a series of world trips—was very instructive. It showed the old city and many of its Bible-famed relics. The Pathe Review showed Canada's asbestos mines, Constantinople and juvenile athletics. It was a grand show throughout.
