MADE IN S.M.I.T. JOHNS VESSEL IS NAMED "KIPAWO"

Ceremony Carried Out By Daughter of Grant Hall FOR BAY SERVICE

New Craft Will Ply Between Kingsport, Parrsboro and Wolfville, N. S.

STRENGTHENING a link in the chain of Maritime trafficways—a modernizing of that—and one more brisk move to meet the increasing rush of travel Maritimeswards, the staunch steel ferry craft Kipawo was christened at noon today as the first of its kind in the province.

VICE-PRESIDENT Grant Hall of the C. P. R. stood on the platform with his daughter, Mrs. H. Stockwell Day, who performed the christening ceremony of the new boat.

After the christening ceremony, the party repaired to the dining quarters of the docking group of buildings, where Caterer John Bond, of the Union Club, had two large tables tastefully spread for a luncheon.

The launching ceremony was quite informal, the only toasts on the list being the usual patriotic ones to His Majesty, a good-luck toast to the owners of the new craft and in recognition of the health of the builders.

JURY DECIDES NO DECEPTION WAS EXERCISED

Declares Youth Knew Woman Had Negro Blood

JURY IS POLLED Judge Reserves Decision on Move to Have Verdict Set Aside

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Dec. 5.—Leonard Kip Rhinelander, wealthy member of a New York family, lost his annulment suit against his mulatto wife, Alice Beatrice Jones, in a verdict returned today by the jury which heard the case.

"Did the defendant before the marriage, by silence, conceal from the plaintiff that she was of colored blood?" Answer, "No."

"Did the defendant before the marriage represent to the plaintiff that she was not of colored blood?" Answer, "No."

"Was the plaintiff, by said concealment or by said representation, or by both, induced to marry the defendant?" Answer, "No."

JURY IS POLLED Mrs. Rhinelander, counsel for Rhinelander, demanded that a poll of the jury be taken, which was done.

JUDGE'S DECISION RESERVED. The functions of the jury were limited to answering the seven questions propounded to it.

Former N. S. Official Sent on Account of Shortage
