**Jockey Club and Ontario Government.**  
Toronto, July 19.—Wm. Hendrie, president of the Ontario Jockey Club, makes public a letter he addressed to Premier Durney on June 16 in which he charges that Attorney General Raney had made "distorted, unjust and malicious attacks" on the Ontario Jockey Club. He says that the club paid the government \$189,867.75 in 1920 while they retained \$180,000 net or five per cent. on the stock of the club, which he thinks was not excessive.

As the value of property increased, the shareholders of the Jockey Club considered they were justified in increasing the capital stock to correspond more nearly with the value of the land, and stock dividends were declared. The Ontario Jockey Club has never paid a cash dividend in excess of five per cent. per annum on the paid up capital except during four years, when an additional five per cent. was paid from the proceeds of the sale of a farm."  
The writer says that the Ontario government's revenue from the race courses for 1920, including the amusement tax, was nearly \$900,000, but that the government had not seen fit to donate one dollar thus far of this sum to the breeding of any kind of horses.
