mat at 1,832,000,000,000 tons, and the annual production of the Lorraine district, which was formerly under German domination, equalled 21,000,000 tons. This will double the ore production of France and will make the country by far the largest producer in Europe.

"Alsace-Lorraine possesses sixty-six blast furnaces, producing 4,000,000 tons of iron, and twenty-five converters and an open-hearth steel furnace that produce two and one half million tons. This additional production not only covers the present needs of France, but leaves a surplus for export."

"Although the end of the war found French iron and steel industries disorganized in respect to peace time requirements and with many mills demolished, and mines in bad condition," says a report by Trade Commissioner Charles E. Wood of the Bureau of Trade and Commerce, "the net result of the war will increase the production of iron and steel in France."

Germany's loss, it is necessary to take into consideration the German market and present German manufacturing facilities to arrive at an intelligent conclusion. Such reports as are available from Germany are in complete contradiction of each other.

"It is clear that France, purposes to produce the bulk of the iron and steel of the world. "Whether this new era in the French iron and steel industry will create an increased market for equipment made in the United States cannot be stated with assurance at this time. It is thought that there will not be any unusual demand, but that American rolling mill machinery manufacturers who are familiar with French practice and who are, therefore, in a position to take up intelligently such inquiries as may be received, may expect to make occasional sales."

"The consumption of iron ore in France is controlled by the coal supply, continues the Commissioner, which for some time will be short. It has been estimated that 60 per cent of the French pre-war production of coal came from the territories that were invaded by the Germans."

"If these coal mines had not been damaged, it is possible that the Germans and deliberately wrecked before being given up to the Allies. To compensate for this loss the Peace Conference awarded to France the output of the Saar Basin in Germany, but this is not enough, and the annual deficit in France is estimated at 20,000,000 tons. The necessity for the earliest possible rehabilitation of French coal mines is evident from these figures.
