Moncton, N. B., June 20.—Grant-Ayer, a well known resident of Westmorland County, died at his home, Fawcett Hill, on Monday evening in his ninety-first year. He was born at Middlebury, Vt., and moved to Fawcett Hill in 1862. In 1878 he was appointed Justice of the Peace for the county and held the position until his death. 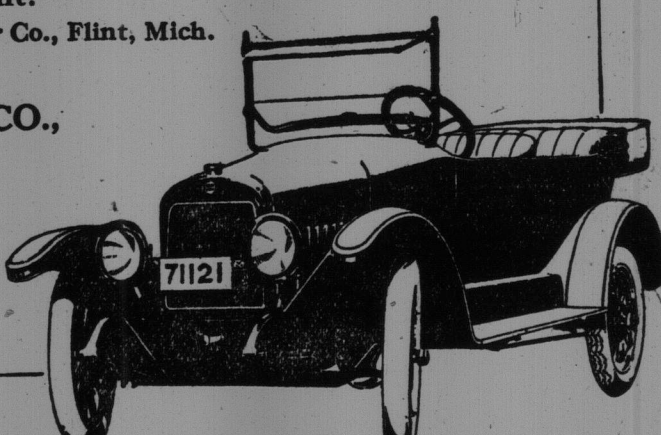
