"Most of our children have never been taught to be sufficiently careful of their teeth, and the result has been a great deal of pain and suffering that might easily have been averted by proper care in the beginning. Nor is this needless suffering the most serious feature: It has been shown by actual experience in this and in other countries, notably Germany, that much of the backwardness of children, which used to be attributed to deficient mentality, is due to nothing more than some minor bodily ills, such as adenoids and defective teeth. When the cause was removed the effect disappeared and children who in olden times would have been allowed to drag behind their fellows have shown themselves to be as intelligent and receptive as any. The medical examination, too, has shown a number of cases of minor defects of the eyes which might have resulted very seriously if they had not been attended to in time.
