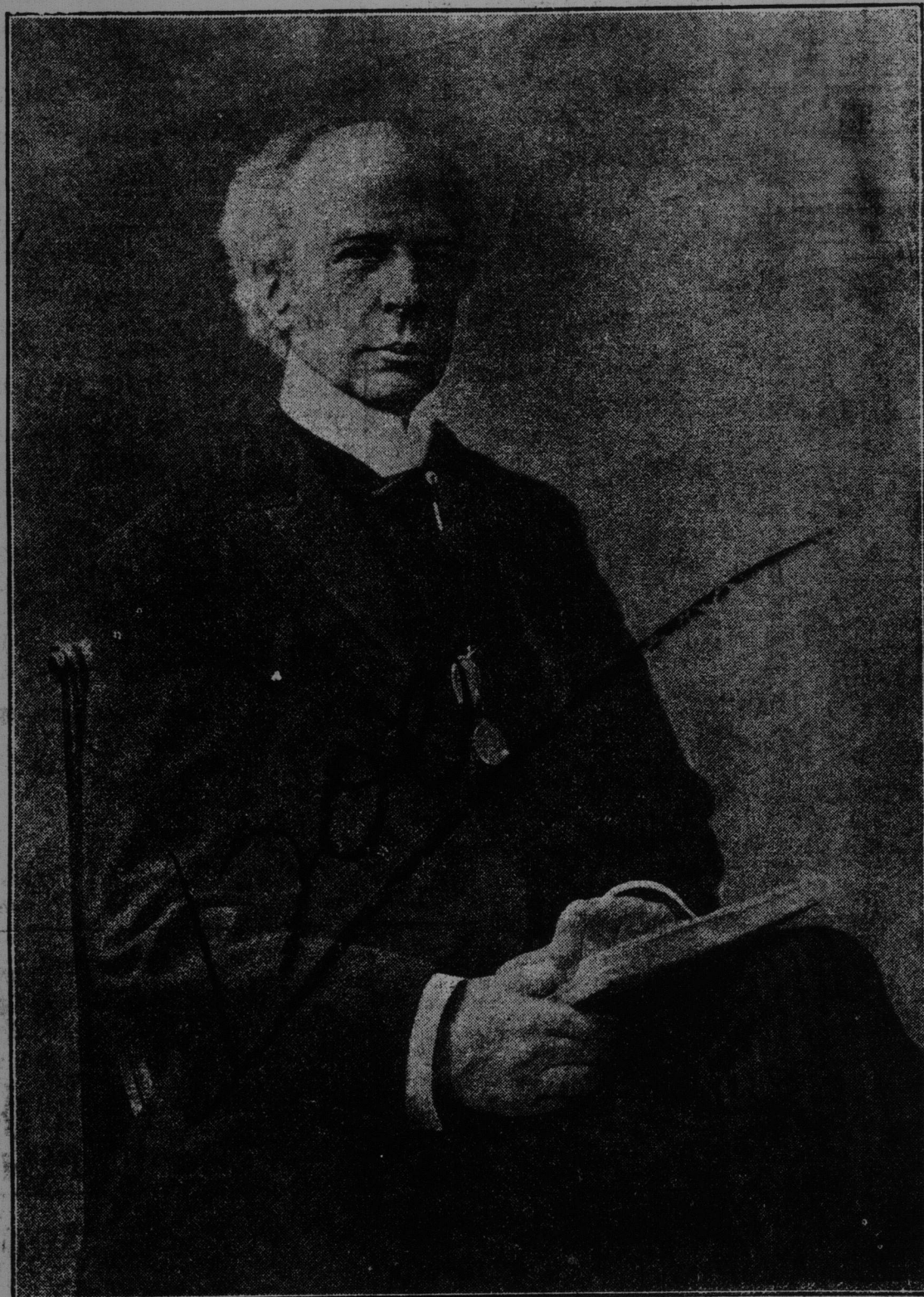

CANADA'S HONORED CHIEFTAIN has been heard in St. John but once, at a non-political gathering about a decade ago. Therefore his visit next Monday will be the signal for a tremendous outburst of enthusiasm. St. John will give him a most flattering welcome. Sir Wilfrid's coming will afford a splendid opportunity to all citizens to hear the Great Reciprocity Agreement discussed from the standpoint of the leader of the Government. Its great benefits to the people of the Maritime Provinces and particularly to the port of St. John will be clearly pointed out. The speaking programme will include Hon. William Pugsley, Minister of Public Works and member from St. John county, candidate for re-election from the city as well as Mr. James Lowell, M.P.P., candidate for the city and county of St. John and others. This will be a red-letter occasion in the political history of St. John. Those who anticipate hearing the Premier speak should make early preparation for the securing of seats. An overflow meeting will be held near Victoria Rink.
