winter, according to a statement last season night by Dr. H. L. Abramson, pro-Vincial pathologist. The Department of Health will be prepared to give immunizing toxoid freely.

Several cases of croupous Diphtheria have made their appearance in Moncton but there is no immediate fear of an epidemic developing. Dr. Abramson son said that the Board of Health has made arrangements for the distribution to hospitals and doctors all over the province of any amount of the toxoid they may require. The toxoid, which he said will give complete immunity, is a development of former toxoids and has been in use for the last four years. Dr. Abramson said that diphtheria had been marked for eradication by science and it was hoped that this would be accomplished with the help of the toxoids.
