

For the first time, so far as present recolection goes, the press of Buffalo has begun to realize that, in so far as grain transportation is concerned, the Dominion of Canada has become a formidable rival of the United States. The Evening News, in giving the views of State Superintendent of Public Works Edward S. Walsh on the Esch-Pomerene bill, now pending in Congress, as it affects the Erie Barge canal, quotes him as saying that in its present form the bill would involve federal control of the Barge canal system and the fixing of through freight rates, thus seriously impairing the enormous investment the state has made for waterways. It fur-

Place your carriers plying the all-water route from the head of the Great Lakes to seaboard, via the New York canals, subject to regulation so that their rates are rigid and inflexible and what will be the result? The Canadian lines to Montreal wil lbe unregulated and unto Montreal wil be unregulated and uncontrolled.
