RAILWAY ACCOMMODATION.

We have been pleased to notice, on the part of the railway authorities, a disposition to fall in with suggestions advanced by this paper, with respect to additional accommodation in sections where needed. And we have another suggestion to make, which we hope will receive that consideration its importance deserves. In the matter of freight accommodation, the stopping of the freight train at the Derby siding, at the South West Railway bridge, has proved a boon to the business men who reside in that locality, and particularly those engaged in the fish trade. But we are of the opinion that this accommodation should be still further extended, so that at least the accommodation train should call at the Siding daily. The Derby Siding is the nearest railway point to a long reach of country extending along the fertile South West branch of the Miramichi River—a section of country which has its milling establishments, an extensive factory for the manufacture of hemlock bark extract, fine farms, and is largely settled. The people are, speaking in general terms, fully as enterprising as those of any other section; and when we take into consideration the large amount of business transacted annually in the district between the railway limits at the South West bridge and the borders of the County adjoining that of York, we are certainly surprised that an order has not already been issued for the stopping of at least one passenger train per day, each way, at a point where these people will be more directly benefited by the accommodation now afforded by the Intercolonial Railway. As arrangements now exist, passengers for Derby and all points above that place, have to take tickets for the station at Newcastle, fully three miles out of their way. And where they have to hire teams to convey them to their homes, as is sometimes the case, they have to pay for this extra staging, in addition to the time wasted. We sincerely hope the railway authorities will view this matter in the most favorable light. The country along the South West is now a feature to the Intercolonial, and we believe it can be made to contribute more largely to the earnings of the road, by placing within the reach of the people, better facilities for passenger traffic than they now enjoy. We hope soon to hear that this suggestion has been accepted by Mr. Luttrell and Mr. Brydges in the spirit which has dictated it, believing that its adoption will be for the benefit of those more immediately concerned.

The Gloucester Election.
We received yesterday morning by telegraph, the following returns of the Gloucester election. Mr. Anglin has been elected by a majority of three hundred and eighty-three. When we take into consideration that his opponent is but slightly known in some portions of the County, and that Mr. Turgeon had also to battle against clerical as well as Government influences, the majority is not so large after all. The influences at work can easily be arrived at when we consider that in Mr. Turgeon's own parish, where the population is composed almost exclusively of his own countrymen, he had only a majority of thirty eight votes. We had no doubt that Mr. Anglin would be returned. Mr. Turgeon is a young man of too little political experience to have expected a victory over such a powerful antagonist, and the only wonder is that he attempted it. If he had accepted good counsel, he could, we believe, have very materially assisted in the return of Mr. Barnes, had that gentleman offered, and he would then have been in a fair way to secure a seat in the Local Assembly. But the fates have willed it otherwise. Mr. Turgeon is not to be censured for his ambition. He aims to be of service to his countrymen, and we have no doubt that he will yet attain to the coveted and honorable position of the people's representative. But we do consider that he displayed considerable imprudence in turning a deaf ear to the entreaties of many of his friends who knew that he could not be elected with Mr. Anglin for an opponent. In this way, coupled with the influences at work, the true feeling of the County with reference to the Government has been smothered. But the end is not yet.

Three Men Drowned.
A lamentable accident occurred on Wednesday last, by which three men met an untimely end. Their names are—Wm. McKen, Henry Goddard and James Van derine. They were engaged in bringing down a raft of deals from Mr. Brown's mill at Redbank. At a time of the accident the boat was about a mile below Newcastle. The men were endeavouring to tow the raft, while using a winch to aid them in their efforts, the men were drawn under, and the men were precipitated into the water. There was at the time near at hand a raft of four men who were in charge of a raft belonging to Mr. McKen. They endeavored at once to render aid, but only two of the men rose to the surface, and they sank again almost immediately, and before any assistance could be rendered. The bodies were recovered during the afternoon, and were conveyed by the tug *Sultan* to Douglassville, where they were laid out in one of Mr. McKen's buildings. An inquest was held by Coroner J. S. Benson, when a verdict was rendered in accordance with the facts stated. Wm. McKen was a single man, and belonged to Douglassville. Van derine, was a native of Chatham. Goddard, was a married man, and was the son of Goddard, blacksmith, (at present in California) belonged to the same place. The bodies were buried in the morning at the same place where the accident which has robbed them of a husband and father.

School Examination at Carleton.
A public examination of the Carleton Centre West, was held on 28th June, in the presence of a number of visitors.
