(Tiny) Valitancourt, glant of the Second division of the United States army, now encamped in Texas City, is looking for a trainer to groom him as a "white hope."
He doesn't know whether he has the making of a prize fighter, but he is willing to try.

"Tiny" is the giant of the army in stature and physique. He stands six feet nine and a half inches in his shoes, and weighs stripped 284 pounds. Other measurements are: Waist, 40 inches; biceps, 461-8 inches; reach, 87½ inches; wrist, 8½ inches; knuckles, 10½ inches; ilength of palm, 4 inches ; thigh, 23 inches; length of palm, 4 inches; thigh, 23 inches; calf. 15½ inches.

"Tiny" does not know his strength. As chief packer of pack train No. 3, he frequently carries as many as five bales of hay, whereas the ordinary "husky" struggles under two.
