It was in the vicinity of about 20 years since the handsome silver trophy, presented by Hon. David McLellan, was wrested from the St. John curlers and taken by the Truro curlers, who until this winter held it, but the Chatham New Brunswick Club managed to capture it from Truro about three weeks ago and New Glasgow having an eye on the trophy went to Chatham, and last Saturday the cup was once more brought back to Nova Scotia territory. The St. John Thistles 16 men strong, arrived here this morning and with a determined air about them, they started in about 2.30 o'clock to try and take the cup back to the city from whence it was taken years ago.

Hyde is the most remarkable criminal with whom the police have ever had to deal. For more than a week he stopped at the finest hotels in this city, spending the days in lounging around the lobby and cultivating the acquaintance of the patrons, and his nights holding up citizens in various parts of the town. Four of his victims identified him and told how much money he had gotten from them.
