NURSING SISTER FROM VLADIVOSTOK

Miss Frances Hanington Here on a Visit After Performing Good Work With the United States Army Overseas.

Among the arrivals in the city yesterday was Nursing Sister Frances Hanington, member of No. 17 Evacuation Hospital Unit, Vladivostok, who is visiting her mother, Mrs. A. H. Hanington, Nursing Sister Hanington, who is a graduate of Newport, I. Hospital, joined the Siberian Expeditionary Force at New York in November, 1918, and proceeded to Vladivostok as a member of No. 17 Evacuation Hospital Unit. Miss Minnie McGuire, Peterville, and Miss McVey, Ottawa, were two of the Canadians in the unit.

The first of the wounded began to arrive in June last, when the Bolsheviks commenced night raids on the U. S. troops, who were guarding the mines and railways. There were many American casualties. Among the Canadians whom Sister Hanington met in Siberia were Lt. Col. A. H. H. Powell, at present adjutant, M. D. No. 7, and Lt. Colonel Worden, Baywater.

OFFICIALS ON INSPECTION TOUR

A party of seven immigration officials from Ottawa, arrived yesterday to inspect the area on which it is proposed to erect the new baggage shed, West St. John. The party with the local immigration agent, J. V. Lantieri, visited the site during the afternoon. Arrangements have been made with the city in regard to the lease of the site, which is the area on which the old cattle sheds were located, and plans for the building have been completed.

The structure is to be one story in height, 475 feet in length and 60 in width. To secure adequate foundation 1,100 piling will be driven.

The shed is to be equipped on either side throughout its length, with a platform 12 feet in width, so that two trains each of 8 cars can take on passengers at one time. When the building is finished, probably 3 months from the time the contract is let, the West End terminals will for the first time be equipped to handle passengers and baggage under cover and away from muddy and slushy roads.

Akron Gets The Baseball Franchise

Montreal is Sidetracked from Securing the Franchise in the International League.

New York, Nov. 6.—Akron, Ohio, will have a berth in the International League next season. The franchise of the defunct Birmingham club was awarded to an Akron corporation late yesterday at a league meeting for a bid of \$30,000.

Other bids were submitted by intercity from Montreal, Scranton, Providence and Syracuse.
