Preparations For
Summer's RacingSchedule Opens in Montreal
Saturday, May 6—The
Outlook Is Bright.

Montreal, April 23.—(Written for the Canadian Press.)—With the approach of spring comes the preparation for the summer's racing throughout the Dominion of Canada. The season, as in former years, will be inaugurated in the Province of Quebec, the first meeting being scheduled to open in Montreal on Saturday, May 6, over a week earlier than racing has ever previously started on a Canadian track. With more settled conditions the outlook for the thoroughbred in Canada this year is brighter than at the commencement of any season for years.

There has been less agitation against racing during the winter months than previously and with the Government well in control of the sport, racing should thrive as it has not done for a long time. The sport a year ago was brought under almost perfect control. The representatives of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police rendered great assistance. They took charge in the Mutual plan as well as around the various courses at which racing was conducted.

The class of horses raced throughout Canada a year ago was superior to any since the suspension of racing in the State of New York early in 1918. The events filled better than in previous seasons while the Canadian horse came into its own. This was shown by the splendid entry to be found each day in events fashioned for Canadian bred and Canadian owned horses.

Even on the smaller tracks the events for Canadian bred horses filled to the limit of the number allowed to start and each event brought forth a stirring finish. This was a good demonstration that Canadian bred horses are more successful in their efforts at breeding and this season is sure to bring about even better results.

Greater encouragement has been given to Canadian bred horses each year by the various racing associations and particularly last season. In the Province of Quebec the Quebec Breeders and Racing Association donated a percentage of the revenue from each meeting to the upkeep of the National Bureau of Breeding, with headquarters at Montreal. The Canadian Racing Association, the senior racing body in Canada, and under whose rules all races are run, donated a percentage to a fund for the improvement of the breed of horses in Canada. These stations are standing in the stud this spring for the first time and within two years their get will be distributed throughout the Dominion.

The control of racing is now well within the hands of Canadians. Each season for the past two or three years a greater number of Canadian officials in the stand at the various tracks and that number will be again increased this summer. The various racing associations have been educated as officials by filling minor positions until now the racing bodies are enabled to find men in Canada to take their places with the best of the American officials in conducting the sport.

With a view to attracting a better class of horses and bringing about greater friendly rivalry between owners of the United States and Canada in races, there has been a general increase announced in the stakes almost throughout Canada. This has been done against long seasons to some of the tracks a year ago, showing that behind the racing are in the game for the better of the sport rather than altogether for the gain to be derived from it.

The greatest of Canadian events, the King's Plate, race run in the spring at Woodbine Park, Toronto, and the King's Plate race run in the autumn at Elm St. race track, Montreal, will have an increased value again this season. The Ontario Jockey Club of Toronto has already announced the increase in the stakes of the King's Plate race. The Montreal Jockey Club will, no doubt, announce the increase for the event run at Elm St. race track later in the season. These events are for Canadian bred horses and the stakes in such events are the most important in the Dominion. A year ago the racing association ruled in strict manner, and the power of the officials is likely to be increased this season, which is an assurance of even better and more sport.

Horsemen have already commenced to arrive in Canada from winter racing centres, which means that work of preparing the horses for the early season will commence at an early date. Even now the horses which have been wintered in Canada are undergoing early training work at Woodbine Park and at some of the courses in Montreal.

Officials of the Quebec Breeders and Racing Association have determined to follow on the lines of the Canadian Racing Association and enter more liberally to longer distance racing. This plan was adopted by the C. R. A. some years ago and has worked out in an admirable manner, with the result that only three definite events are permitted at any track during an afternoon's racing.

As an early preparation for the opening of the campaign in the summer, a number of Canadian owners have shipped to Maryland which will offer good opportunities for getting the Canadian winners ready to start without the usual running tactics in training which are so detrimental to the condition of the thoroughbred and have the tendency to break down horses which start the season in sound condition.

Racing throughout Canada is now held under the rules of the Canadian Racing Association, they being adopted by the Western Racing Association, which includes Vancouver and Victoria, British Columbia, and the Quebec Breeders and Racing Association, which controls the majority of the tracks in the province of Quebec. With a working basis and those of the United States undesirable in racing are eliminated with the result that the sport is being placed on a firmer and better foundation. Under these conditions there is no opportunity for trainers, owners or riders committing infractions of racing laws at one place and operating in the next by moving to another. Promoting Friendly
Correspondence Between
School Children

Leeds, Eng., April 24.—Hearty approval of a scheme to promote friendly correspondence between school children of Leeds and those of various American cities has been given by Premier Lloyd George in a letter to James Watson, headmaster of Harrogate Council School here, who has instituted the idea as a means of stimulating interest in composition, geography, writing and spelling.

Under Mr. Watson's plan, each child has one particular correspondent, whom he or she addresses by name. The letters written in school under supervision, are the unfaded work of the scholars. They form part of the ordinary composition lesson, but have proved to be its most attractive feature. Incidentally, the letters received offer convey valuable hints to teachers in regard to methods used in America, which are frequently made the subject of inquiries by the Leeds education authorities.

A recent mail brought 120 letters from pupils at four schools in Washington, which in the opinion of educationists here are remarkable for their excellent composition, good handwriting and correct spelling. The ages of the young American correspondents average 13 and their letters range from 500 to 1,000 words in length. They are full of the Washington conference, but personal touches and descriptions of the schools and their surroundings are not lacking.

Occasionally the English children are puzzled by Americans. A reference to "Buddie" as the name of the Unknown Soldier proved difficult even for the masters, but "my teacher" is a first-class soccer ball fan" was more easily interpreted. "Dear Unseen Friend," one letter begins, "I choose Leeds because I like it from what I have studied about it, so please tell me something about your city."

Many letters express a hope for an

everlasting peace between the two countries and most of the young American sign as "Your American Friend."

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
