Dan McArthur, son of Peter McArthur of Ekfrid, came over in the same boat but is stopping in Toronto for a day or two.

The Women's Guild of St. James' church, Wardsville, will hold their annual garden party on the rectory grounds there on Tuesday evening, July 2nd. Horace Pedrick, mine sweeper, is back from England and is now awaiting his discharge from the navy. Mr. Pedrick was about three years in the navy, having done a tour of duty which he had last September, most of the time being engaged in mine sweeping. He expects to resume his trade as machinist at London and will make his home with Daniel Hurley.

Mr. Irwin concludes his pastorate of the Glencoe Methodist church next Sunday and is preparing to move to Lucknow. Mr. Garbutt of Lucknow, who will conduct the service, the first Sunday in July, Glencoe will regret to lose the citizenship of Mr. Irwin, who was always active in any public undertaking that had to do with the service of his community—one who evidenced himself a clear and forceful speaker and ever ready for the occasion. There can be no doubt that in the church he has accomplished a good work during his pastorate.

Next Sunday being the nearest Sunday to Dominion Day, it is being observed throughout the country as Patriotic Day. The service at the Methodist church in the morning will be according to the printed program for such a service, except that the memorial tablet for the fallen soldiers Cecil Bechill and Isaac Kunes, who were members of the church, will be unveiled, after which it will be placed on the wall in the church entrance. In the evening the service will be withdrawn in order to join in the union thanksgiving service in the town hall at 7 o'clock to commemorate the signing of the peace terms.

During his course at Yale Kunes has received four scholarships and three fellowships. For nearly four years he was pastor of the Avon church, one year of the Killbuck church and a year ago took the pastorate of the Woodbridge church."

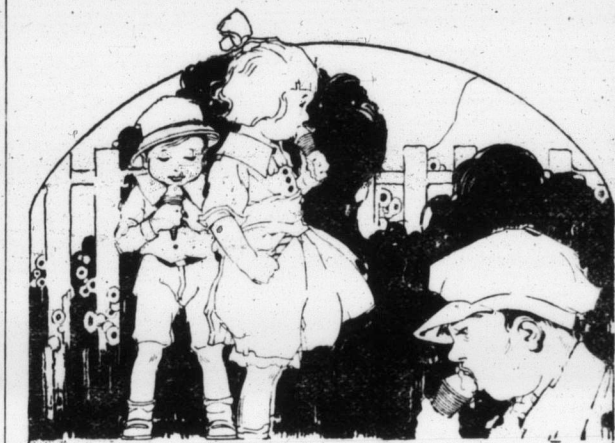
