HOSPITAL RATES HAD TO BE RAISED BY THE BOARD

Higher Cost of Maintenance the Reason. Increases However are Small. To Act on Grand Jury's Recommendation. MORE PUPILS IN TRAINING.

At the meeting of the Hospital Board last evening it was decided to advance the rates charged for some of the wards in the hospital, owing to the constant increase in the cost of maintaining the institution. The \$2.00 wards were advanced to \$2.25; the \$2.25 wards in the new wing were raised to \$2.50, and the obstetrical fee was increased from \$2.00 to \$2.50. These new rates will come into effect on Nov. 1st. It was also decided to increase the number of pupils in the Training School from 20 to 25. The report of the Grand Jury respecting their visit to the hospital was read, and the Property Committee was instructed to have red lights placed at the exits as suggested. The matter of putting a fire escape on the east end of the building will be dealt with when the new building enterprise is undertaken.

During the week ending September 20, 4313 firms employed 36,305 persons, an increase of 3,450 over the week ending Sept. 13.

SEVENTH GAME OF SERIES MAY BE THE DECIDING ONE

CHICAGO FIGHTING WITH "BACK TO WALL" CINCINNATI, Oct. 8.—Fighting with their backs to the wall, but hopeful, despite their four defeats, the White Sox met the Reds today in the seventh game of the world's series. The Reds and the 32,000 fans who witnessed yesterday's ten inning battle, felt confident that the contest would be a decisive one and that before night the men of Moran would be proclaimed the baseball champions of the world. Before the game started it was believed that Manager Gleason of the White Sox would send Eddie Cicotte to the mound to face the Red nine.

W.C.T.U. HAS NOT ENDORSED LADY

DOES NOT CONSIDER WOMAN SHOULD RUN. OTTAWA, Oct. 8.—The point blank refusal of the Central W.C.T.U. to endorse the candidature of Mrs. J. C. Sears, in West Ottawa for the provincial house, is due, it is claimed to the fact that the central union feels the organization should concentrate solely to the task of bringing out the voters in connection with the prohibition referendum. However, while this is the reason given by the union, there seems to be some misunderstanding among the union membership. All are in favor of a woman candidate, but many are of the opinion it would hurt the temperance cause to bring one out this year.
