Discovery May Save The Lives of Babies

CAUSE OF TEETHING TROUBLES LEARNED BY RESEARCH
OTTAWA, Feb. 4.—A discovery of far-reaching importance has been reported to the headquarters of the Canadian Army Dental Corps here by Major F. M. Wells, who has just returned from England where he has been engaged for the last three years in research work for the corps at the Lister Institute of Preventive Medicine in London.
Major Wells' research work disclosed the fact that food deficient in its "vitamines" prevents the hardening of the teeth as well as seriously impairs the general health and structure of bone formation. Through his discovery it will now be possible to eliminate most of the ills consequent upon decaying tooth conditions through a system of proper dieting.
Through the latter it will now be possible to bring children through the difficult period known as "teething" without the usual distress and suffering, eliminating in a large measure the heavy infant toll from convulsions, dysentery and other ailments, incidental to teething.

Died at 103 Years of Age.
Mrs. Katherine Baker died at Belmont near Wingham Saturday in her one hundred and fourth year. She was born in 1815 married when sixteen years of age; she has had ten children and five hundred grandchildren and great-grandchildren the greater number of whom she had outlived. Some of her children survive at ages ranging from seventy-five to eighty-five.

Guelph Will Pay Damages.
After dragging along the courts for nearly three years the Guelph City Council at a lengthy session decided to settle the suit for damages brought against the city of Guelph by ex-Mayor Harry Mahoney and to pay him \$1,800 in full settlement of all claims and costs.

At the first trial the city won the case. Mr. Mahoney appealed, and the Appellate Court awarded him \$1,800 and costs. The city declined to accept this as final, and took the matter to the Supreme Court of Canada, and the case was to have been heard this month. The new Council, however, decided to start the new system of civic government with a clean slate, and the first thing it did was to wipe this off.

Mr. Mahoney had his leg broken in 1916, while he was Mayor of the city, at the blowing up of a dam in the river, and as the Council took no action toward making any offer to settle he brought action. The total cost to the city will be about \$2,500.

An extensive street paving program is in contemplation for Galt, on instructions from the Galt City Council. City Engineer Fairchild notified the Bell Telephone Co., the Dominion Natural Gas Co. and the Public Utilities Commission to have all proposed underground work on West Main Street from Queen Street, Galt, to the south end on Water Street from the macadamized road to Concession Street on Concession Street from the G.T.R. tracks to the bridge, on Wellington Street from Main to Dickson, on Queen's Square, done as soon as possible, as the paving of these streets is under consideration. The streets mentioned aggregate about two miles and are all important thoroughfares.
