Some means should be taken to secure the payment of a laborer's wages, but in so doing there should be no interference with prior rights of other parties. In other words any law which may be passed in the tuture respecting the settlement of laborer's claims should not in any way affect obligations undertaken prior to the passage of such a law. Some of our prospective legislators might spend a little time profitably in considering what sort of law will best meet the necessities of the situation. The thing to be arrived at is to secure equity for all parties, laborer and employer alike.
