A Message from the Legislative Council, by the Honorable Mr. De Léry, one of the Masters in Chancery :

Mr. Speaker,

The Legislative Council have passed the following Bills, to which they desire the concurrence of the Assembly :

An Act for consolidating and amending the Laws in *Lower Canada*, relative to Larceny and other offences connected therewith.

An Act for repealing various Statutes relative to the Benefit of Clergy and to Larceny and other offences connected therewith, and to malicious injuries to property.

An Act for improving the administration of the Criminal Justice in the Province of *Lower Canada*.

An Act for consolidating and amending the Laws in *Lower Canada* relative to malicious injuries to property.

And then he withdrew.

And the said Bills were severally read the first time.

On motion of Mr. *Solicitor General*, seconded by Mr. *Samson*.
