New ticket is \$12

The most significant change in ticket prices and structures for the Canadian Open at Glen Abbey this year is the introduction of an "any day" pass for \$12.

The \$12 ticket will admit a spectator to the grounds on any one of the six days of the tournament, including practice rounds and tournament play. Golf fans can also purchase a weekly pass at \$55, which includes admission for the practice rounds on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, as well as the four following days of play.

Tickets are available at selected Toronto Dominion Bank branches and are also available through Toronto Dominion Chargex. For more information on Chargex tickets, call 1-416-842-1010, which is Golf House at the Glen Abbey Club in Oakville.

All 500 executive package tickets (at \$625 each) have been sold.

Tickets are also available at BASS ticket outlets (923-3080 for orders) and at Eaton's and Simpson's T.R.S. ticket offices.

Of course, if a spectator makes a sudden decision to visit the open, tickets are on sale at the public entrances to the golf course.

CBC covers four rounds

Golf fans in both Canada and the United States will turn their dials to Oakville in June as the 1979 Canadian Open Golf Championship for the Peter Jackson Trophy is played at Glen Abbey.

Television cameras (an estimated 18 are in position) from CBC-TV will cover the action on all four days, while CBS television will carry the final two days of action. The Open will also be carried in the French language to viewers on the Radio-Canada network.

It means three sets of commentators, three sets of broadcast locations on the roof of Glen Abbey's million-dollar clubhouse, and millions of dollars worth of equipment working perfectly. The man responsible for it all is veteran CBC-TV producer Robert Moir. The director is Ron Harrison, also a veteran of hundreds of golf, hockey, baseball and track and field telecasts.

Again, CBC will be providing an experienced team of commentators, including Don Wittman, Don Chevrier, former Canadian professional Stan Leonard and others, with cameras covering the action from the 14th through 18th holes. CBS plans to send its well-known team of Ken Venturi, Jack Whitaker, Frank Gifford and Frank Gleiber, also under the direction of executive producer Frank Chirkinian.
