

AN OLD INHABITANT GORE.—The widow of the late Wm. Lyon Mackenzie, whose death was announced the other day, must be placed among the contemporaries of the "Pioneers of York," to which place she came, with her husband, in 1824, and where she has ever since lived, except during the years of Mr. Mackenzie's political exile from the end of 1837 to 1849. She shared the varying fortunes of her husband under every circumstance, the particulars of which are widely known through his published biography. There was perhaps not among the "York Pioneers" one whose memory of past events was so vivid; and who had so great a command of particular facts and so estimable a recollection of persons. She delighted to relate the particulars of past times; on which she had formed opinions that never varied. To the last she read with great care the events of the day, and kept

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thoroughly acquainted with passing events. Though over seventy years of age, she retained perfect command of her faculties to the last hour. For three and four days, she had been fully aware that she could not recover, and was quite resigned to her fate. There are thousands of persons by whom the intelligence of her death will be learned with regret. The funeral of the deceased takes place this afternoon from the residence of her son-in-law, Mr. Charles Lindsay.
