Judge Woods, in response to a request from the Rector and Wardens of Christ church has consented to give an address on the history of Christ Church during the past 40 years. The address is in connection with the 40th anniversary of the church and will be delivered next Monday evening at the Young People's Society in the school room.

An interesting fact in connection with the gun boats that were sunk up the river, is that Mrs. Adam Arnold, who was one of the two boats claimed and scuttled, while the historical society claims there were three. Mrs. Arnold was born in 1819, and had often heard Mr. Arnold speak of the burning of the boats, but he never mentioned more than two, the one at Fisher's and the one at Pikeville.

Sam Kearney, the sunken log raiser, says he knows where there are four more gun boats up the river. One is so full of cannon balls that he can't raise it, and the other three he can't get down through them.
