graves of the departed dead.

This bridge has given the council a lot of trouble and some are dissatisfied with the judgment shown by the council in repairing the bridge, hence the inscription written by one of the dissatisfied councillors. The Arnold mills were built somewhere about the year 1796. Frederick Arnold and his four sons came to Kent County about the year 1786. Of the sons, John settled near Chatham, Lewis about four miles up the river, and Christopher and Fred., jr., settled near Kent Bridge.
