The importance of St. John as depot of the marine and fisheries department will be largely increased by the plans which the department are now preparing to carry out. G. Desbarhes, who is now acting as district, is in the city arranging for

The department has lately been in stalling a large number of gas buoys and other aids to navigation along the coast of the Bay of Funday and in this they have been hampered by the lack of facilities for handling their apparatus. At present they have no particular place to keep their buoys, etc., and no opportunity for making repairs when they are needed. On or near the wharf they will need a warehouse for storing carbide for the gas buoys, spare parts, etc., and also considerable yard room for storing the larger pieces of apparatus. RICHEST WOMAN IN CANADA DEAD

Was Suing Son for Estate Valued at \$15,-000,000, but Purchased From Mother a Few Years Ago for \$400,000

VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 5.-Mrs. Jean Oliver Dunsmuir, widow of the late Robert Dunsmuir, discoverer of the Wellington coal mines on Vancouver was the richest woman in Canada. was eighty years of age.

Mrs. Dunsmuir, at the time of her death, was engaged in a law suit brought against her son, Lieutenant Governor Dunsmuir, asking for an accounting of the estate, valued at about \$15,000,000 left her by her husband's will which a is claiffied was managed by the Lieutenant Governor until he and his brother the later Alexander Dunsmuir purchased it for \$400,000; a few years previous. The statement of claim, filed in the suit heing that the deal was put through up on misrepresentation

Mrs. Dunsmuir came to British Colver Island, where the Hudson's Bay Company had a post, and worked a coal mine, long since abandoned. Afterwards they went to Nanaimo, and it was the discoveries of coal by the late Robert Dunsmuir at Wellington which founded the fortune of the

family. A ... The present litigation promised to be long-drawn-out, and whether it will be carried on by the daughters, who sided with their mother, is not known, Mrs. Dunsmuir is survived by Jas.
